Al Schrauben Nominated for National Award

Shamrock girls basketball coach, Al Schrauben, will be traveling to Minnesota in June, as one of eight coaches in the country who will be vying for the title of Girls Basketball National Coach of the Year.

Al learned recently that he had been nominated by the Michigan High School Coaches Association, and had already won at the regional level. He and his wife, Carla, will go to the ceremony in Minneapolis in June, where the national winner will be announced.



Al graduated from St. Pat's in 1972, attended Central Michigan University, and came back to Portland as a teacher. He taught at St. Patrick School from 1978 to 2008 and served as Athletic Director for nearly 20 years. He retired from those positions at the end of last school year.

His coaching career has been stellar, spanning 24 years. During that time, he has posted a 482-114 record, had 12 teams go to the state finals and brought home six state championship trophies.

New Youth Ministry Coordinator

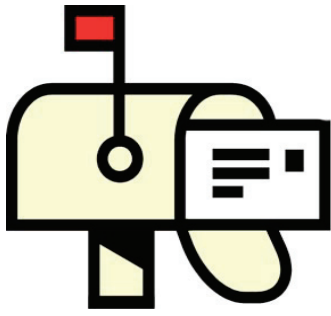
We would like to welcome Guine (pronounced Gwen) Norman, who arrived in December to fill the position of Youth Ministry Coordinator.

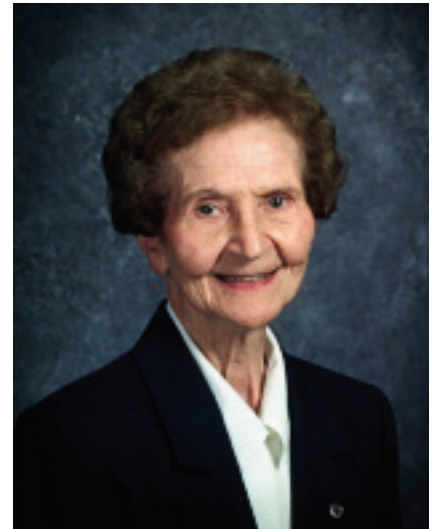




Mail Call

Next year, God willing, I will turn 80. Today I am a substitute teacher for 6th grade. God has blessed me with a terrific wife and so many other gifts—faith, family, friends and food, including the Eucharist, which we receive daily.

It was sad to hear that Jim Schaffer had passed away. When I was at Aquinas College (1964-1968) I recruited Jim as a student, basketball and cross-country runner. He was a very good Catholic gentleman... and has now joined his parents, Unk and Mary Jane in heaven.

Sister Patricia Ann Kidder, IHM, who served as the elementary principal of St. Patrick's School from 2006-2008, died unexpectedly of a heart attack on Christmas Eve at the age of 79.

Sister Patricia was one of six daughters born to Francis and Anna Kidder of Akron, Ohio, and was given the name Edna. She attended elementary and high school at St. Mary's Catholic School. She became a member of the IHM in 1947.

Sister Patricia Ann earned a bachelor's degree from Marygrove College and a master's degree from the University of Michigan. She taught for 27 years in schools in Michigan and Illinois and was co-principal, administrator and principal at IHM High School in Westchester, Illinois for six years.

From 1977 to 1981, Sister Patricia Ann ministered in the Archdiocese of Baltimore, and in the fall of 1981, she began a 24-year ministry in the Cleveland Diocese.

Sister Patricia Ann is survived by her sister, Frances Mauren, and many nieces and nephews. Her sisters, Helen Cosgrove, Rosemary Keller, Agnes Kirkland and Patricia, preceded her in death.

In The Spotlight

Jane Finkbeiner

Jane Finkbeiner came to work at St. Patrick School in 1990. Though she began as a part-time employee whose primary duties were on the playground and in the cafeteria, she eventually joined the custodial crew who keeps our school looking so good. Jane has three sons, Patrick, Derek and Brendan. In her spare time she enjoys gardening and scrapbooking.



Growing up in Westphalia, the daughter of Francis and Dolores Thelen, Jane was raised on a farm along with her five brothers and sisters. She was a tomboy, who with her brothers, often got into trouble for riding the pigs. She was also known as the Willie Horton of farm-yard baseball for her ability to hit the ball all the way across the dirt road.

Fortunately for St. Patrick's, Jane moved to Portland to raise her family, and was adamant that her three sons would attend a Catholic school. It was often a struggle financially to come up with the money to send them there, but according to her son, Derek, she would go without things for herself, to make sure that all three graduated from St. Pat's. "I was there to see my mom's tears when her 'baby' Brendan graduated in 2006," said Derek. "They were pouring down her cheeks, she was so proud."

Derek also commented on what it was like having his mom working at the school, while he was a student there. "It was hard at first, and I didn't like it—especially get-

ting detentions from my own mom! But, I got used to it and finally figured out that it was okay, and even had benefits. One of the things that I liked the most was not having to wait in line on pizza days. She would always have my pizza and pop waiting for me."

Derek continued, "The one thing that amazes me most about my mom is her dedication to her work and her family. I know that she loves the kids at the school as if they were her own, and I've seen the concern she has about the students that she interacts with every day.

"When she worked on the playground, she taught us lessons that we didn't even realize at the time we were learning—teamwork, fair-play, respect and that actions have consequences.

"I worked with my mom at the school for three summers during high school and I got to see her hard work first hand. I saw the blood, sweat and tears, and gained a new respect for her. I saw, truly, that she was not only working hard

to provide for her family, but that she took a deep pride in the appearance and meaning of St. Patrick's School. For many years, her schedule was erratic—a few hours on, a few hours off—back and forth all day, from 7 in the morning until 8 at night. But, she rarely complained. She has definitely taught me a lot about hard work!"

According to Principal, Randy Hodge, "Jane is an extremely hard worker, is very positive, and loves having the opportunity to come to work everyday to see the students. I know that she used to see the kids more when she spent part of her day supervising lunches. She has expressed to me that she misses the daily contact with the students at lunch but still enjoys the opportunity to see them around the school every day.

Thank you, Jane, for the dedication that you have shown to St. Patrick's School through the years. You have touched the lives of many, many people and have given us a school building that we can be proud of. Westphalia's loss was definitely our gain!

From the Principal

The school year is about 75% complete and everything is going well at St. Patrick School—in fact, we're having a great year. As the school year has progressed, there are two questions that people ask me on a regular basis. The question I get asked the most is, "Do you like your job?"

When I answer this question and tell people that I absolutely love my job they usually pause and stare at me for a few seconds. Then, they follow up with the second most frequently asked question, "Really?"

Really! I would like to tell you some of the reasons why I enjoy serving as the administrator at St. Patrick School as much as I do.

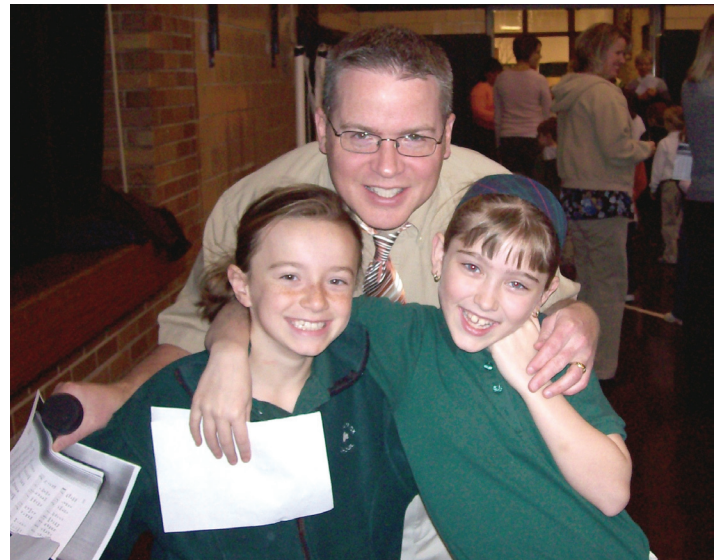
Let's start with the students. The students at this school are outstanding. They are well-behaved and perform at a high academic level. Their work ethic is unmatched. They represent themselves, their families, and faith extremely well. It is an honor to come to work and have the opportunity to serve these students each and every day.

People often wonder how a high school as small as ours can be so successful in athletics. The reason is because the work ethic and character of our student athletes is unprecedented around the state. That same work ethic means that our students are able to find gainful employment because St. Pat's has a good reputation and state-wide name recognition. These things affirm the decision that Michelle and I made to send

our children to St. Patrick School. We decided that sending our kids to St. Pat's would cost us the yearly amount in tuition—but the value of a diploma from St. Patrick School is priceless.

The second thing that makes my days enjoyable is the parents. The parents at St. Patrick's are very supportive. They have made a financial commitment to send their child here because they believe in our mission. I have found that if a student is having a problem at school, that problem is usually solved with a phone call or an e-mail to the parents. It is easy to work together with the parents—as partners—to make sure their children have a foundation for success when they graduate.

Lots Happening at St. Pat's

- February 3, 2009, was the grand opening of the St. Patrick School branch of the Portland Federal Credit Union. The student run branch provides St. Patrick School with a unique opportunity to offer financial education and money management skills to our students. Students in grades 2 – 12 as well as staff members are able to use the school run branch each Tuesday during lunch period.

- There will not be any major changes in the developmental kindergarten or kindergarten programs at St. Patrick School next year. Our kindergarten program will continue to be all-day sessions, five days a week. We will continue to offer half-day sessions for DK. The morning session will run from approximately 8:30 – 11:30 and assuming there is enough demand, we will offer an afternoon session from approximately 12:25 – 3:25. Your child does not have to be five years old before December 1st to enroll in our DK program.



- Our kindergarten screening will be held Tuesday, April 21, 2009, from 9:00 – 3:00 in the Parish Hall. You may sign up for a screening by calling the school office at (517) 647-7551.

- Beginning next year, our juniors and seniors will have the opportunity to attend classes at the Heartlands Institute of Technology.

- We have purchased curriculum materials from Financial Peace University (the company founded by Dave Ramsey) so we can offer a Personal Finance class to our high school students. We are going to require Sophomores to take this class in the second semester of the school year. We have chosen this age and grade because this is the time in a high school student's life where personal finance begins to become important. They begin to get jobs and drivers licenses, and start to think about life after high school. We want to make sure our students are completely prepared for life beyond high school when they graduate.

Standardized Scores Highest in Area

In December, Mr. Hodge released the St. Patrick High School 2008 American College Test (ACT) scores as well as the scores for the Michigan Merit Exam (MME). As you can see from the charts below, St. Patrick School scores are the highest in the county and well above the state average.

The ACT is a national college admissions examination that consists of four subject area tests plus a 30-minute Writing Test. ACT results are accepted by all 4-year colleges and universities in the U.S.

NEW FOUNDATION

At the end of 2008, a sizeable bequest was given to the parish from the estate of Sue Crosby. The only stipulation was that it be used for youth in the parish Youth Ministry program. Because of Sue's love for the youth, it seemed most fitting to set up a special Foundation in her memory so that her bequest could benefit Youth Ministry in the parish both now and in the future.

An account has been established with the Catholic Foundation of West Michigan which is a Diocesan Foundation. Each year the interest will be disbursed, but the principle will never be used. This fund will assist youth who would otherwise be unable to attend special events in the Youth Ministry program.

With the establishment of the Suzanne Crosby Foundation, we now have three foundations available for parishioner contributions. They are the Father Flohe Foundation, the Suzanne Crosby Foundation and the St. Patrick Parish Foundation. The latter was established in the mid-1990's to fund special educational opportunities. Those opportunities can include not only the school, but evangelization, adult education, youth ministry and children's religious education as well.

EUCCHARISTIC ADORATION

For many years our parish has been blessed with Eucharistic Adoration each Monday from noon to 5:00 p.m. and Wednesday from noon to 7:00 p.m. During this time, the tabernacle in the Blessed Sacrament chapel is open so that anyone can come and

benefit from Jesus' real presence in the Blessed Sacrament. It is truly the best quiet time you can spend.

The only requirement to having Eucharistic Adoration is that someone be there at all times during these hours. Ideally, two people would be present at all times, and the best way to assure that, is to establish a schedule where individuals sign up for a particular time slot and then commit to being there each week during that hour. Sometimes folks team up and alternate covering an hour every other week.

You might be thinking that's a big commitment. Yup, it is, but the benefits for you, your family and the parish are amazing. You want to hear something else amazing? Jesus loves it when you come and regularly unload your fears, problems and faults on Him. Also amazing is that, after a while, you actually start looking forward to it. He does too.

NEW PARISH GROUPS

This committee is made up of members who are committed to growing the Body of Christ here at St. Patrick Parish through social events— not for the purpose of raising money— but to help people to get to know one another better. The Culinary Angels. This is another relatively new group in the parish that provides meals for parishioners (and beyond) who have a short-term need.



New Things For Lent

This year, during the Lenten Season, we are doing a couple of new things here at St. Patrick Parish. These endeavors have given our parishioners new opportunities to spend time in prayer and fellowship.

Stations/Soup Suppers. On Friday evenings during Lent, Stations of the Cross are being held at 6:00 p.m., followed by Soup Suppers in the Parish Hall. This event is headed up by Ken Schneider and his wife Karen Stevens, and is sponsored by our new Hospitality Committee.

Thanks to Ken and Karen, we've had a five-fold increase in people attending the Stations of the Cross! The Soup Supper features many different meatless soups—at least 10-12 different varieties each week—along with homemade bread and rolls. The soups are provided by anyone who wants to participate. I'd like to say thanks to all who are providing the homemade soups and the homemade bread. It is certainly helping to make our Lenten journey a holy time!!!

Evening Mass. Another new thing we are trying during Lent is having Mass on Tuesday evenings instead of Tuesday morning. I'd heard from a number of people over the last couple of years that it would be nice to have a weekday evening Mass for those who work during the day. Well, our first Tuesday evening Mass at 6:00 p.m. was attended by about 60 people--again, a number much higher than what we see at a regular weekday morning mass.

Since Tuesday evenings are normally meeting nights for several councils and committees, we are beginning the meetings a little earlier than normal, with Mass, and then go into the business portion of the meeting. We'll evaluate this change after Lent and see if this is something that would be beneficial for the parish if we were to make this a permanent change.

Children's Liturgy of the Word

Plans are underway for a new program at St. Patrick's that will begin in the fall of 2009. Deacon Don Sobolewski and a group of volunteers are putting together a ministry for children from Kindergarten through 3rd grade. The program is called the Children's Liturgy of the Word.

The Children's Liturgy of the Word will take place during the 9:30 mass. After Mass begins and the opening prayer is said, the children will leave together as a group. They will go to the choir room located below the sacristy, where, they will listen to the same readings that the rest of the congregation hear, but in language and vocabulary that they will more easily understand. The readings will be followed by a short reflection period that will include discussion, questions and answers, songs and simple activities. The children will return to their seats during the collection.

"It's important to understand that this is not a babysitting service," said Deacon Don. "Neither is it a catechism class. It is a worship experience, structured to help children better understand the Word of God."

Adult volunteers will be needed to facilitate the program. Ideally, there will be four teams of four who will rotate on a monthly basis. There will be no cost to either the volunteers or the families. Adult leaders must have attended a Protecting God's Children Awareness Session and they will have to have background checks completed.

"We may be ready to go by summer," said Deacon Don. "But, people go on vacations during the summer and have different schedules. When school starts in the fall, schedules get back on track. That's when we plan to start the program."

In the meantime, there's lots to be done—from recruiting and training volunteers, to converting a meeting/storage room to a kid-friendly worship and learning environment, to putting together materials and finalizing the schedule.

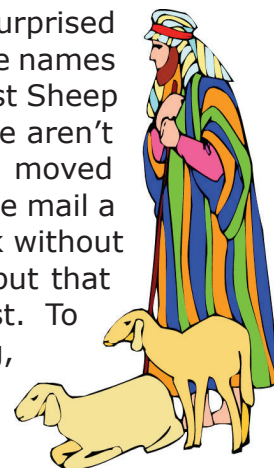

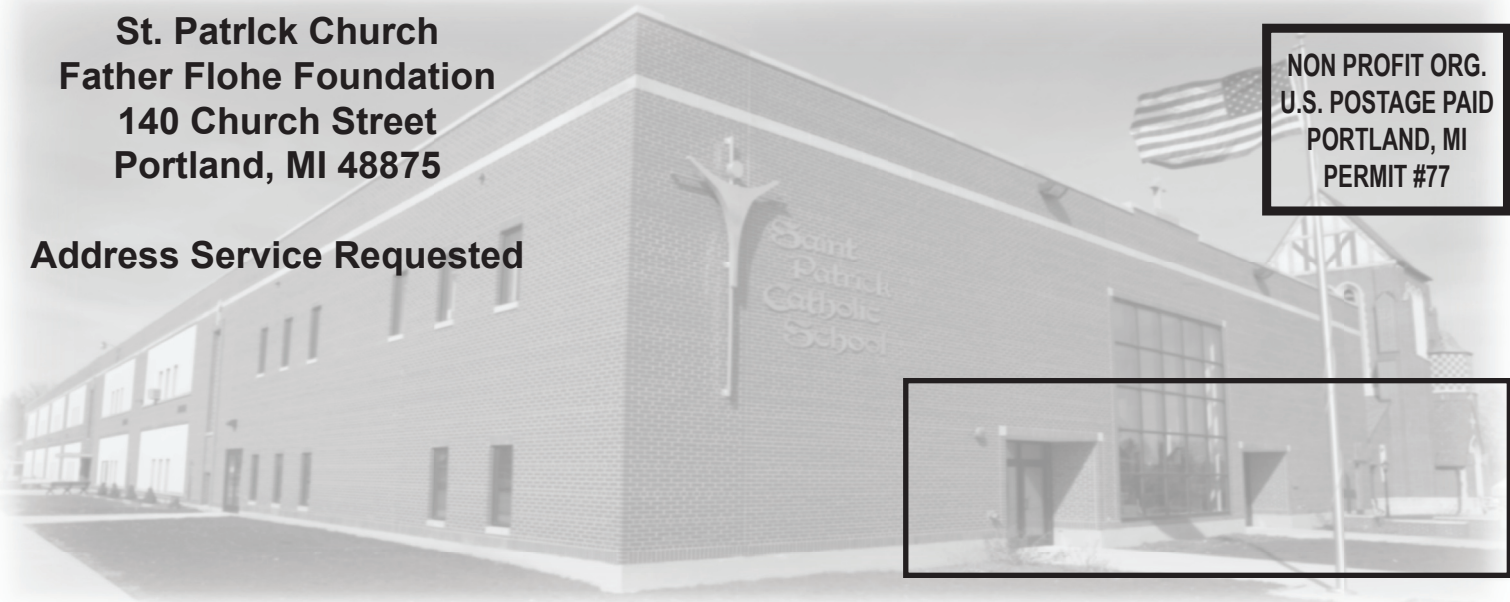
