Class of 1961 Celebrates 50-Years

They were the ninth class to graduate from St. Patrick High School, a fine group of students—16 boys and 21 girls. Class officers were: President Paul Platte, Vice President Joyce Martin, Secretary Joyce Blundy and Treasurer James Hilligan. Duane Smith was President of the Student Council; valedictorian of the class was Barbara Strong and salutatorian was Jim Russman.

They returned to St. Pat's on Saturday, September 10, 2011 to celebrate the 50th anniversary of their graduation. Classmates had been asked to contribute information to a memory book, a copy of which was given to each of them. They were asked to name their favorite teacher—and though many were named, the overwhelming winners were Sr. Bernard Marie, Father Malewitz and Coach Ken Johnson.

During the tour of the school, one classmate, Judy (Thelen) Martin, commented that she could almost still see the nuns in the school.

Classmate John D. Pung who lives in Wyoming was unable to attend the reunion, but he sent eight dozen roses and chocolates for his classmates.

Grad Fulfills Movie-Making Dream

Aaron Russman (St. Patrick Class of 2000) has been going through life in fast-forward mode for the last couple of years creating an independent film, *Lost In The Future*. He paused long enough to bring his movie debut to the public at the Wealthy Theatre in Grand Rapids in August.

Lost In The Future is a screenplay Aaron began writing in 2003. The tale takes a character named Lucas and his newfound friend Margarita on a journey through America's Midwest and time periods of eras past. For props, makeup and wardrobe befitting the eras presented in *Lost In The Future*, Aaron used resources such as his grandmother's vintage possessions, antique stores and secondhand shops, and gets by with a little help from his friends and family. Aaron's girlfriend and clothing designer, Victoria Nelson, helped with wardrobe using her eye and flair for time-period costumes. Nelson also assisted with hair and makeup for the cast. Aaron's mom would feed the troops and his dad would lend a hand with audio. Friends stepped in when they could with production-type work. Aaron explains: "I am the production manager, which gets a bit stressful and frustrating because I also have a full-time job, but it's all worth it"

Aaron grew up in the small country town of Portland, with its dirt roads, farms and cornfields as far as the eye can see. It was there at the age of 16 that Aaron starting seeing things more through the camera's eye and began to make his own cohesive short films. Aaron started playing around with a video camera his dad bought in the early '90s. He convinced his four sisters to step in as characters and help-

ers as they made all types of short movies growing up, and his sisters also have parts in *Lost In The Future*. "We had action-adventure, comedy, suspenseful-drama; ridiculous stuff, but pretty fun. I was interested in all the camera tricks, like stop-motion animation with action figures, or positioning the camera sideways to look like you were climbing up a wall, like the '60s Batman show. We totally winged the stories in those days," says Aaron. During high school Aaron worked on a few B movies in Michigan and Virginia and came to realize that he needed to venture out on his own in order

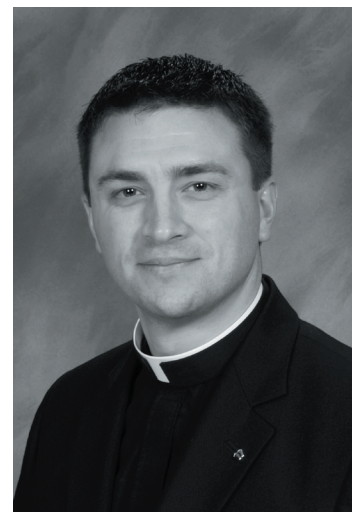
Son of Alumni Ordained to Priesthood

Pat & Stacy Russman

Pat (1991) and Stacy Russman are an amazing couple. They both teach at St. Patrick School, and they are also very active in school/parish activities. We tricked them into giving us information for this article by telling each of them that the other one was being honored. So, they wrote about each other—beautiful tributes that were straight from the heart, and the parts that came shining through were that both of them have a deep love of family, church and St. Patrick School. If you know Pat and Stacy Russman, it only makes sense that sports was involved in their meeting. Pat was working as a groundskeeper at the Portland Country Club the summer of 1993 and Stacy was working in the pro-shop. It was love at first sight, but they were both college students, so they dated for five years before Pat brought Stacy back out to the PCC and proposed to her on the golf course.

They were married on Friday, June 4, 1999, which was a school day. "When we walked out of church, we were greeted by everyone in the school—they had banners and bubbles, and they had come over to surprise us," said Stacy. Once again, a fitting beginning for a newly married couple who would spend as many hours together at the school as they would at their home.

Pat grew up in a large family. He took music lessons and was involved with 4H. He hunted and trapped and did farm chores, but most of all, he enjoyed playing sports. The Russmans had a basketball court at the top of their barn and Pat spent many hours there, playing basketball with family and friends. "Many times I saw Janet go flying off the court onto the square hay bales," said Stacy. "The drop-off of the court could be very steep if there weren't enough square bales in the barn." As he got older, Pat loved weightlifting. Before he had a driver's license he would ride his bike to St. Pat's School to lift weights.

Pat had attended St. Patrick School for twelve years, and knew from little on that he wanted to teach there some day. After graduation he attended college at Olivet, playing football for four years. Olivet Col-

lege had a rule that their students couldn't do student teaching at the school from which they had graduated, and that rule didn't set well with Pat. He was very persistent and finally wore down his counselor—who gave in and let him return to St. Pat's to student teach. When he was hired to teach physical education at St. Pat's in 1997, another of his plans fell into place. Over the years, Pat would teach phys ed and history and he would coach basketball, football and track.

Pat's favorite coaching moment was coaching his cousin, Tim Chamberlain. Pat spent many nights after practice sitting in the pole barn with Tim, going over the play book. When the team won, Tim was always the one to start the Shamrock Fight Song and the football song. Pat always had a huge smile on his face when Tim started singing. He was so proud of Tim and his accomplishments.

Stacy also came from a large family, graduating from Portland High School in 1993 and attended L.C.C. for two years before transferring to Olivet College to work on her own teaching degree. She, too, had her eye on St. Pat's and a couple of years after her husband began teaching there, she also was hired to teach 3rd grade at the school.

And, like her husband, she took on many additional duties. Stacy was the cheerleading coach, she worked with the Youth Group, she was very involved in the PTO and she also worked with the local post of the VFW, organizing many Veteran's Day programs and Veteran's Salutes. The State of the School

The beginning of the year is always an exciting time. Most students are eager to return and see what is in store for the new school year. There is much to be excited about this year at St. Patrick School.

Our enrollment is up 9% over last year, making this our third consecutive year of growth, and an 18% increase since 2008. Our high school enrollment is over 100 for the first time in five years and we opened an afternoon session of three-year-old preschool. We have our largest developmental kindergarten and regular kindergarten classes in years. We have been able to increase our enrollment while maintaining smaller class sizes, by splitting most grade levels into two sections. This is also helpful in ensuring that students receive the individual attention that they need.



Over the summer we made many capital improvements, including:

- **New computer lab.** This state-of-the-art facility includes a ceiling mounted projector and new server.
- **Smart boards.** Our kindergarten classrooms as well as our middle school science classroom have added Smart Boards to enhance instruction. We are

seeking donations that will allow for the purchase of more Smart Boards.

- **Multi-media projectors.** All teachers now have multimedia projectors in their classroom or have access to one at all times. We hope to have projectors mounted to the ceiling in all classrooms by the beginning of next school year.



- **Middle School science lab.**

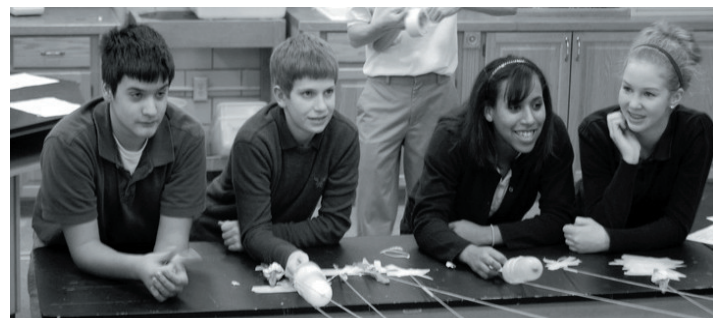
We have a new middle school science room, equipped with built-in tables and a sink to enhance hands-on learning opportunities.

- **Whiteboards.** The whole school had whiteboards installed which allows us to phase out chalk which is detrimental to students with allergies.

- **New carpet/windows, etc..** Four classrooms had new carpet installed and 44 windows were replaced throughout the facility. The main office, principal's office, and the counseling office were painted. The maintenance office was moved and completely renovated.

- **Athletic facility improvements.** There have been some improvements made to our athletic facilities as well. The finishing touches are being put on the new softball field. The dugouts have been painted and we will be adding safety fences in front of the them. A used scoreboard has been donated to the football field, and it has been painted and installed.

We are excited to start the new school year and believe all the improvements in technology and facilities will continue to enhance the educational opportunities at St. Patrick School. St. Patrick's Athletic Association is much more than a "booster club." We provide 100% of the funding for the entire athletic program at the school. The work we do gives all students in grades 5-12 the opportunity to participate in sports. Last year 88% of our high school students participated in at least one sport. We also provide financial support for the Shamrock Quiz Bowl team.

Our school and our athletic program have been blessed with a generous community and plenty of volunteer labor. Because of this, and in keeping with our tradition, we are very proud that our athletes do not pay to play. Many schools have had to institute these fees, cut some sports from their programs, or eliminated the use of buses to sporting events. Not only have we been able to avoid any of these cuts, for the third year in a row, we have added a new sport to our program. Some of things that we did in the past year include:

- Reinstated boys cross country, with our first full team in almost 50 years.
- Began 5th/6th grade volleyball.
- Began girls cross country (*see more below*).
- Hosted the CMAC Baseball Tournament at CMU.
- Purchased new uniforms for seven teams.
- Saw girls basketball coach, Al Schrauben earn his 500th varsity win.
- Saw baseball coach, Bryan Scheurer named regional Coach of the Year.
- Constructed a softball field that allows our teams to play side-by-side with the baseball teams.

This year we have what I believe is our first-ever full womens cross country team. I would really like to hear from alumni who ran cross country, men and women either as a team or as individuals. I'd like some history to share with the current runners. I would also like to expand the school record listing for track to include cross country, so I need to know what any former Shamrocks ran, both in the old pre-5K cross country days and the more modern 5K cross country days. KING'S COLUMN

Long-Range Planning Continues

For the past two years the Diocese of Grand Rapids has been undergoing a professional study involving long-range planning for the diocese. Although there were several factors that prompted the study, most prominent was the decline in the number of priests and the fact that the average age of priests in our diocese is around 63. Already we do not have enough priests to staff all of our parishes.

The reasons for the decline, not just in our own diocese, but in many parts of our nation, are numerous including a more secular and affluent culture, declining church attendance (especially among the “40-and-under” crowd), parents having fewer children, celibacy (although I think this is a much smaller factor than many people think), and in particular the lack of support and encouragement from parents and family members for young people to consider a religious vocation.

With this current decline, it should not come as a surprise to anyone that some changes need to be made. The reality is that some parishes will close (but that is only once the parishioners themselves arrive at that determination). Other parishes will be clustered with one or two other parishes with one priest serving them. This transition may be difficult for some, but sharing a priest is better than having no priest.

There are some parishes that may be designated as a “seasonal” church where there will be Mass there at only certain times of the year. There are other parishes that, for now at least, will not be asked to share a priest

with another parish – most likely, St Patrick is one such parish.

Notice, I used the words “for now at least” because the trend is that the number of priests will continue to decline for the foreseeable future. A professional study was done for our diocese and it is anticipated that by the year 2020 we will have fifteen fewer priests, and by 2025 seven more fewer priests, and by 2030 another seven fewer priests available to serve the people of our diocese. These numbers take into account any anticipated ordinations. These are truly harsh realities, but this is where we are and it does no good to look the other way or hide our heads in the sand and hope things will change for the better. We have to prepare for the eventualities as well as find better ways to counteract those factors that have led to fewer and fewer vocations.

The Good News, however, is that Jesus said he would never abandon us. The Holy Spirit is present among us and always will be! We only need to let God do more of the leading and make sure that we are listening to what is being said to us. When we listen, God blesses! Currently there are some in our own parish who are listening to the urgings of the Spirit and saying “YES” to the possibility of pursuing a religious vocation. As of this writing our parish has two seminarians studying for the priesthood. They are Mike Stefes, Jr. who is studying at Mundelein Seminary in Chicago, and Ryan Riley who is in Sacred Heart Seminary in Detroit (studying for the Diocese of Lansing). I know of at least five other parishioners who are earnestly discerning whether God is calling them into a religious vocation. Please keep them all in your prayers that they may listen carefully to the Lord’s calling – wherever it leads!

The decline in the number of priests may also be an avenue whereby the Holy Spirit may bring more lay people into paid employment in church ministry, as well as volunteers who want to be good stewards of their time, talent and treasure to help build up the Kingdom of God here on earth.

Returning to the long-range planning as we strive to build up the Kingdom of God here at St. Patrick, the following, are the proposed recommendations for St. Patrick Parish:



1. Review the number of weekend Masses at St. Patrick Parish and consider the reduction of one Mass time along with the revision of the weekend Mass schedule.

2. Create a master site plan and address the needs to update, renovate and possibly expand facilities.

3. St. Patrick High School should develop a plan for increasing enrollment which includes the recruitment of students from St. Joseph (Pewamo), Sts. Peter & Paul (Ionia), St. Anthony (Saranac), and St. Edward (Lake Odessa).

4. Develop a parish catechetical plan to strengthen programs of elementary religious education, adolescent catechesis/youth ministry, and adult faith formation.

Stay tuned for an update as to how all this fleshes out in the next issue of The Shamrock. In the meantime, your prayers would be much appreciated.

From the President's Desk *by Kevin Schrauben*

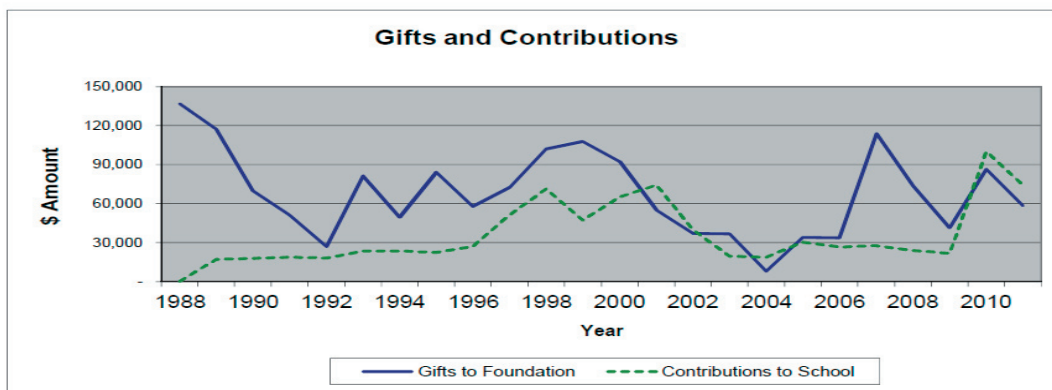

St. Patrick School to Establish Board of Directors

On behalf of the School Commission I would like to express our excitement for the start of the 2011-2012 school year. The Commission is committed to fostering the growth of Catholic education at St. Patrick School for grades Pre-K through 12th. The core responsibilities of the Commission have been to serve as an advisory committee to St. Patrick School administration, to act as a liaison to parents and parishioners with concerns relating to school affairs, and to create and maintain effective communication between key school and parish committees.

This year and next will be a time of transition for the St. Patrick School Commission due to the recommendation by the Diocese of Grand Rapids that calls for the establishment of a St. Patrick School Board of Directors. The current Commission will be seeking prospective nominees including: parents (40%), alumni/parents of alumni, leaders within the civic, business, and professional community, and finally parishioners. Following appointment by Father Larry, the Board consisting of 9 to 17 members will have Limited Jurisdiction and will work closely with Father Larry and Principal Hodge to assist in the governance of the school. During the initial appointment, members will be assigned to staggered terms of 1 to 3 years with the option of renewal for three additional years. The Board will have direct responsibility to Father Larry and through him the Diocese, and will also receive regular information regarding Grand Rapids Diocesan policies impacting Catholic elementary education through inservices by Principal Hodge. Along with the new name will be additional responsibilities.

Although the Board will continue to do what it has in the past, it's primary concern will be the ministry of Catholic education via strategic planning and formulation of policies relating to academic, student, and faith community affairs. The Board of Limited Jurisdiction will be responsible for, in part, the evaluation of the Principal, effectiveness of school policies, mission effectiveness, and board operations. Finally, the Board will have oversight of financial operations as well as the oversight of and participation in institutional advancement/development programs designed to attract human and financial resources. The School Commission looks forward to these new responsibilities and to assisting in the development of the new model.

The current members of the education commission are: Jennifer Meredith (Chair), Nikki Brown (Vice Chair), Jill Scheurer, Jennifer Davlin, Diane Bissell, Ken Cook, and Dave Zimmerman. For additional information about the

commission, please take the time to review the commission webpage on the St. Patrick School website. We value any ideas, comments, or suggestions you would like to share. We appreciate the commitment you have made to Catholic education and we are committed to making this a very successful year at St. Patricks.
