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Benefactor to Help FFF Reach Goal of \$2,000,000

Al Schrauben Inducted Into BCAM Hall of Fame

1 Schrauben has begun his 28th season at the helm of Lthe Portland St. Patrick girls basketball program, but his first as a member of the Basketball Coaches Association of Michigan Hall of Fame.

Schrauben, who was inducted into the Hall's Class of 2011 in September, has guided the Shamrocks to six Class D state championships, and four more appearances in the state finals since taking over the program back in 1985.

"I was certainly surprised but very gratified," Schrauben said of his induction. "It means a lot that the program is solid. Any time that you win an award like this, a lot of people are involved: parents, coaches and certainly most of all, the players that we've had over the years."

To qualify for the BCAM Hall of Fame a coach must have been a head coach of high school varsity or college basketball of 20 years or more and/or accumulated 300 or more victories. Schrauben entered the 2011-12 campaign with 513 wins, and as just the seventh coach to reach the 500-win plateau since the MHSAA began sponsoring basketball in 1973, the first in the mid-Michigan area.

Schrauben said that the key to his success through the years was making the game fun for his players, something that he didn't fully embrace at first.

"It took me a while to figure out that the game is for the players," he said. I thought I was a lot more ready as a young coach than I probably was. Over the years, I've had more fun, and I think that allowed the kids to have more fun."

Schrauben said that the family atmosphere at St. Pat's has also been

a key component to the team's success, and that doesn't appear to be changing any time soon.

"I'm starting to get daughters of players that I had before, so I'm starting to feel a little elderly," Schrauben said. "Our roster names don't change a great deal over time, and I think that's one of the things that has made it successful. Older sisters and cousins have passed down our philosophy to the girls. We have a lot of traditional things that we do, and I think that's important."

Although Schrauben is retired as a full-time teacher at St. Pat's, he said that he has no plans to leave the girls basketball program any time soon.

When Joyce Kransz walks in the graduation ceremony at the Louisiana Superdome on May 12, she will have completed another leg on a journey to "Live God's Love Out in the World." Joyce will graduate from Loyola University with a Master's Degree in Pastoral Studies and will accomplish a feat which she once thought was not only undoable but unnecessary. What she learned in the course of her studies is that, just as learning should be a life-long endeavor, learning about our faith also should not stop with Confirmation.



oyce Kransz remembers clearly a moment in her life that seemed trivial at the time, but which turned out to be monumental and pivotal.

"Tom Jandernoa asked if I would be interested in joining the RCIA team," she said. "Of course, my inclination was to say 'no' but instead I said 'maybe.' Six months later I was working as a catechist, along with Jim Moses and Russ Thelen, teaching classes to the candidates."

Joyce was surprised that this seemingly random request led her into an arena that felt so natural and so fulfilling. The truth is Tom spotted something in Joyce that she herself had not yet discovered.

But, others had noticed it, too. A short time later, Deacon Don called Joyce and asked if she could lead a prayer vigil at the funeral home. Both Father Larry and Deacon Don were busy and couldn't go, and they felt it was important for someone from St. Patrick Parish to be there to support and assist the grieving family.

Joyce felt very unworthy and unprepared to take on such a daunting task, but having lost both of her own parents, she certainly remembered what it felt like to be part of the bereaved family—so she said yes. She was nervous, but she set those feelings aside and tried to concentrate on doing the best job she could for the family. With God at her side, she did just that.

Soon, other opportunities were opening up within the parish, and Joyce was asked to help in other ministries. Again, her instincts told her to step back, but her faith propelled her along.

"I give a lot of credit to Deacon Don for nourishing a seed," she said. "I told him my fears—that people who have known me forever would reject me in such roles. He said something to me that changed my life forever."

What Deacon Don told Joyce on that memorable occasion was this: "It is because you are from here and you

are one of them that they will relate to you. You have lived life with all of these people. You think like them; you are one of them. You're only using the gifts that God has given you."

And he was right.

It wasn't long before Joyce found herself back in school pursuing a degree which was much different from the degree she had received decades ago when she became an x-ray technician. "I thought that my education was complete when I graduated years earlier. I had no idea that God would lead me on a completely different path," she said.

She received a bachelor's degree in Theology from Sienna Heights University in 2007 and began working on her masters.

People who know her aren't surprised at the direction that Joyce's life has taken. She grew up in a large Catholic family, the fourth of six children. Though she never attended St. Patrick School, she observed and learned the importance of faith from her parents.

When she was an elementary student, her mother cooked meals for the Sisters at St. Pat's School. Joyce tagged along and developed a friendship with Sister Kit Kaiser. It is a strong and lasting friendship that exists, yet today. Through Sister Kit, Joyce has also become close to many other Sisters and enjoys spending time with them at Nazareth. In 2008 she proudly and joyfully became an Associate of the Congregation of St. Joseph.

"I have been blessed to be supported by the Sisters and here at St. Pat's by Father Larry and Deacon Don," she said. "They encouraged me to step out of my comfort zone and reminded me that lifelong learning applies to faith as well as life. There's always more to learn...and I am hooked!"

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The State of the School

The 2011/2012 school year has been going very well at St. Patrick School. Our students have been working hard and growing and maturing academically, spiritually, physically, and socially.

We also have been blessed to have our school enrollment continuing to grow. We currently have 104 high school students which is the most since the Class of 2006 graduated. Our total enrollment has increased to 364 students which is a 10% increase from last school year. We are expecting this trend to continue and are anticipating an increase in enrollment for next school year.

We are continuing to upgrade and improve technology throughout the school. Currently, seven class-rooms have ceiling mounted projectors and Smartboards mounted for teacher and student use. We would like to have elementary classrooms completely modernized with ceiling-mounted projectors and Smartboards by the beginning of the 2012-13 school year.

We are still evaluating the use of laptop computers, iPads, and other technology. There is much debate about iPads versus laptop computers. We value any input from alumni who have expertise in this area.

Our School Commission is in the process of transforming from an advisory role to a School Board with limited jurisdiction. They will have input in strategic planning and on formulating some school policies next year.

We are evaluating how we schedule high school students to see if it is possible for them to gain more college credit before graduation from high school. We are excited that the softball field's final phases will be completed and St. Patrick School will host the softball and baseball districts this spring at Father Flohe Field.

Thank you for the support of St. Patrick School. We are blessed to have the opportunity to run a Preschool through 12th grade facility with the limited resources we have available. The success we have comes from so many individuals willing to share their time, talent, treasure, and prayers.



School Board Role Evolves

s you may recall from the fall issue of the Shamrock Newsletter, I discussed the recommendation of the Grand Rapids Diocese for School Commissions to transition to a Board of Directors with Limited Jurisdiction. This change will allow for the Board to more formally assist the Pastor and Principal in the governance of St. Patrick School. The main goal of the Commission for this academic year has been to thoughtfully review the guidance and recommendations of the Diocese and prepare for the implementation of the School Board this September. To this point, I would like to update you on the progress the Commission has made toward this goal.

The Commission has determined that the School Board of Directors will consist of 11 members and will be comprised of current Commission members, as well as parents, alumni/parents of alumni, leaders within the civic, business, and professional communities, and finally, other parishioners. Parents of currently enrolled children will make up not more than 40% of the board to maximize broader, long range planning. While current Commission members will be responsible for iden-

By merging Big Rocks/Little Rocks with our Church Buddies program, we now have a top-notch program that contributes positively to our entire school family.

How does it work? When a student enters St. Patrick School as a DK or Kindergarten student, (s)he becomes a Little Rock and is assigned a Big Rock 6th or 7th grade student to be his/her special friend and mentor. This pairing of students continues through the elementary grades, with 1st graders pairing with 8th graders, 2nd graders pairing with high school freshmen, and so on, up through the 5th graders being paired with seniors. With few exceptions, the Big Rocks and Little Rocks remain a team until the younger student reaches 6th grade.



The older students take on the responsibilities of assisting their younger elementary peers throughout the school year with the positive benefit of being reminded regularly they are role models with little eyes watching them. "I love this program," said 8th grader Nick Coyne. "I can see a younger me in my buddy Isaiah Pelc. I like to see him growing in knowledge. He is very fun to talk to and mess around with."





Catholic Schools Week Homily

by Father Larry King, February 5, 2012

Te gather here this morning as a parish to celebrate the conclusion of Catholic Schools Week – an annual event where we THANK GOD for his blessings on this parish ministry of St. Patrick. The theme this year has been "Catholic Schools: Faith, Academics, Service."

St. Patrick Catholic School is a ministry of St. Patrick Parish - whether you send your children to St. Patrick School or not. Why is that? It is because the

majority of Catholic Church leadership across the country - whether ordained leadership or lay leadership - comes out of Catholic Schools.

Now I can't say that I know all the reasons for this reality, but I can point to one factor that really stands out, the fact that in a Catholic School children are im-

mersed on a daily basis in a Christ-centered education. Now, in saying that I don't mean to imply that Christ is not present in public schools, for Christ truly is present there too. He is present in the good people that work there - some of them are Catholic and from our own parish. They do their best to model the love of Christ to their students by how they treat them. Unfortunately and regrettably, however, they are handcuffed by our laws that forbid them to speak about God or Jesus Christ or Church or religion, or their own faith in any way, shape or form.

That is not the case at Catholic Schools. The children at St. Patrick School and other Catholic Schools - and I want to emphasize this point once again because this is the primary reason for sending a child to a Catholic School – is that they are immersed in a Christ-centered education. Jesus Christ can be proclaimed without fear of retribution. The faculty can speak about God, and they can speak about their own faith, and they can bring God into every aspect of the academics that they teach so that students understand in practical ways how God works in the world and that God is part of everything that we do and is not just for an hour on Sunday. The faculty is allowed and encouraged to pray openly with their students, and for their students, and for the families of their students, as well as any needs in our world.

When all is said and done, in the grand scale of things, more than anything else, isn't it faith in Jesus Christ and helping children to grow in their relationship with Jesus Christ that we want for our children? Our society today more and more wants us to ignore or eliminate any talk of God from our lives, as if God doesn't exist or is uninvolved in our daily lives. We are flooded with anti-Christian and anti-God messages all the time in the media. What is there to counteract these anti-God mes-

sages?

For public school students, here at St. Patrick Parish we have our Faith Formation classes for children, but that is only 90-minutes week and possibly add another hour for Sunday Mass - that's not much. Catholic Schools children

God-messages all day long in a variety of ways - most of them very overt and intentional.

Now, having said all that, let me emphasize that the primary teachers of faith and relationship with Jesus are you, the parents. The Church, and St. Patrick School as well, are here only to assist you parents in passing on the faith to your children. So much depends on whether or not you parents are living out your faith at home on a day-to-day basis. Children learn what you parents live!

tifying and recruiting new members to the Board, Father Larry will have final approval of all Board members. During the initial appointment, members will be assigned to staggered terms of 1 to 3 years with the option of renewal for 3 additional years. The Board will have direct responsibility to Father Larry, and through him, the Diocese.

The work of the Board will be largely carried out through standing committees. These committees will have as their primary concern the ministry of Catholic education through strategic planning, execution of initiatives and the formulation of policies related to academic, student, athletic and faith community affairs. While standing committees must be chaired by a School Board member, the remaining members will come from outside of Board membership. Therefore, one can serve on a standing committee that highlights their talents and interests without having to serve on the "official" School Board. For example, if you have a particular interest in marketing, you can serve on the public relations committee without having to attend School Board meetings.

As you can see, there are a lot of exciting changes taking place with the School Commission. So, how do you get involved? The Commission is actively looking for energized and committed people who have a strong desire to devote their time and talent back to a school that gives so much to its students. Nick's classmate, Riley Pline agreed. "My Little Rock reminds me so much of myself at that age," she said. The reason I do what I do with her is because I remember my Big Rock and what she did for me. My Big Rock was always an inspiration to me. I hope that's how my Little Rock feels about me."

The younger students understand they are valued because they have an older student looking out for them, who is there to help them with special projects or just to say hello. They take pride in watching their own Big Rocks participate in extracurricular activities throughout the school year. Little Rocks usually can't wait to grow up and be big enough to have their own Little Rock to watch out for.



Each Wednesday on school Mass day, the older students go to elementary classrooms and meet up with their Little Rocks before Mass. They make sure their elementary peer has filled out a slip of paper listing any good deeds from the week or offering prayer intentions. The Big Rocks escort their Little Rocks to Mass and sit with them modeling good behavior and helping them become active participants in the Mass.

At least once each month the teams go back to the classrooms after Mass to work on a service project. Some of the projects they've completed this year include making cards for veterans on Veterans Day and writing letters to Santa for the annual Macy's charity. Later this spring they will walk together in our annual charity Walk-a-Thon.

They also participate together in fun events. During Spirit week they made signs to hold at the Powder Puff and Homecoming games. This year they completed a

school/church scavenger hunt during Catholic School's Week, and another year they did Reading Month activities.

Principal Randy Hodge said, "Every time I see the students interact, from scheduled activities to impromptu high-fives in the hallway, I am reminded of what a terrific program this is. Each year the 5th grade students purchase and share a cake with their graduating Big Rocks during the seniors' last week of school and will often present them with graduation gifts as well.

"Essentially, we have found the sky is the limit for providing opportunities for our older and younger students to work together learning, praying, and in service to others. It is very satisfying to watch them come together and grow in many ways throughout each school year."

Children are more apt to "catch" faith from you parents if you are living out your faith and have a relationship with Jesus Christ! That quite specifically means that you are an active part of this faith community and regularly and actively participate in worship. If you're not attending church on a weekly basis, then you are teaching your children that Church and growing in a relationship with Jesus Christ in not very important.

So, you parents have a huge responsibility - your children have been entrusted to you by God to lead them back to God! It is critical that your example at home leads your children to Christ! Again, St. Patrick Parish only has limited access to your children - and that access is so much less if your children are not in a Catholic School setting – and that puts much more responsibility on parents.

St. Patrick School is not perfect, although we strive toward that goal. We excel in academics – as is evidenced by test scores – and we engage the students in Christian Service projects to help them understand that Christ calls them to be good stewards of their time and talents. But again, when all is said and done, St. Patrick School exists primarily to immerse children in the Catholic faith – and we do not apologize to anyone for fulfilling this mission given to us by Jesus Christ as he himself went about doing in the Gospel today - to preach the Good News of salvation to everyone and lead people to God.
