Financial Literacy Pays Off for St. Patrick Students

Financial literacy amongst U.S. high school students is at an all-time low while the need for financial literacy is at an all-time high. According to Champions for Financial Literacy, a non-profit group from Colorado, only 25% of Americans feel well informed about managing household finances.

Six years ago, a finance class was added to the St. Patrick high school curriculum as a requirement for graduation. "When we decided to bring the Dave Ramsey Financial Peace University Class to SPS, we felt that to truly ensure that our students are prepared for life beyond high school, they needed to know and understand personal finance," says Principal Randy Hodge. "If we wanted to continue to be one of the top high schools in the mid-Michigan area, a class on finances needed to be a requirement for graduation. I think it has been a remarkable success."

One section of the class, taught by Mr. Terry Austen as part of the Career Development Class, requires students to research scholarship opportunities. Senior Shannon Wilcox located the H&R Block Finance and Budgeting Challenge, which

would grant \$3 million to the winners. Shannon presented the challenge to her classmates and they decided to

work on it. Little did she know this decision would change the financial outcome for two of her classmates and

reward Mr. Austen's class with financial gain.

Across the nation, 32,000 students participated in this challenge, which consisted of a computerized simulation that created real life financial situations requiring personal finance decision making and budgeting skills. Students had to answer financial questions, invest in retirement funds, manage expenses, save money and pay bills and taxes.

The challenge lasted several weeks, with the students using class time to work on it.

Mr. Austen stated, "The students worked well as a team and everyone was committed to this scholarship so they were very willing to give advice to one another."

When the winners were announced in January, St. Patrick High School had a lot to be proud of! Of the 32,000 students who participated, Elijah Hoppes, son of Juli and Alan Hoppes, placed 9th; Noah Pung, son of Glen and Eva Pung, placed 14th. They placed in the top 5% of all entrants. Each of the young men won \$20,000. An additional classroom scholarship

In The Spotlight

Doug Carr (1989)



In 1987 Scoutmaster Jim Winslow was approached by the City of Portland about a possible project for the scouts. The City was interested in creating a walking trail along the old railroad bed which ran behind the post office up to Community Lake and beyond. Jim knew exactly the scout to offer this project to. Doug Carr was 17 years old and ready to work on an Eagle Scout project. Needless to say, Doug didn't shy away from the opportunity. He quickly agreed to take it on and began the arduous task of turning a neglected and overgrown area into a pleasant nature trail that could be enjoyed by people of all ages. Doug never dreamt that his 1.1 mile Eagle Scout project would be the catalyst for Portland's Rivertrail system, a trail that is known far and wide and used by thousands of people each year.

Doug's first order of business, after accepting the challenge, was to draw up a plan and have it approved by the City Council. His plan proposed cleaning the track area, removing the old railroad ties, building benches, providing trash receptacles and putting a bridge over the Lookingglass River behind the feed plant.

The City Council approved the entire plan, except for the bridge, which they felt needed to be designed and engineered by professionals.

With the help of family and friends, the young scout began what would be a two-summer-long project. Railroad ties were removed, trash was picked up, overhanging branches were trimmed and hauled away. Doug and his dad, Chuck Carr, rented a bush hog to mow down the weeds and long grass which encompassed the entire trail area. They also built four benches and installed them along the trail with trash barrels nearby, and laid down a bed of wood chips to prevent the trail from becoming muddy and unusable.

"I have to give credit to several people who got involved in this project," said Doug. "The one who helped out the most was my father. He helped me so much, with everything from renting the brush hog, to helping me build and install the benches and trash barrels. My mother and brothers were there, too. Without their help, I never would have been able to do this big project alone."

Looking back at the project now, it was quite an undertaking for a 17-year-old high school student. In addition to all of the work that he did, Doug also needed to approach businesses and individuals for donations to help cover the expenses.

Perhaps the biggest highlight for him was the day that his mother called him while he was working at Lear's Grocery Store to say that Dick Evans from Channel 8 News had called. He wanted to come out and interview Doug for a segment of his "On the Michigan Road" series.

When the trail project was finished, residents of the Portland area could walk all the way from Divine Highway to Rowe Avenue, a distance of 1.1 miles. The trail was embraced immediately, encouraging the Portland Downtown Development Authority to suggest adding a paved trail from the old railroad bridge to Thompson Field the following year.

Rex Wambaugh, City Manager at the time, said in an article in the R & O, "The idea caught on and spread like wildfire."

In the same R & O article, Portland Parks and Recreation Director Mary Scheurer said, "Public participation speaks for itself. We are very pleased that people have taken to the Riverwalk like they have. I hear comments every day that it's the best thing to ever happen to Portland."

The current Rivertrail system loops the city, and has additional legs that go to Portland High School and around Bogue Flats. It's length is over nine miles, and it can truly be called a million-dollar linear park.

Doug graduated from St. Patrick High School in 1989. He worked at GM for a few years, and attended Lansing Community College and Montcalm Community College to pursue a career as an EMT and firefighter. In 2012, Doug went to work for Delta Township as a paramedic/firefighter.

And, yes, Doug still enjoys using the Rivertrail!

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Technology is Alive and Well

Each spring, we survey the school parents to see whether they have any questions or concerns. One of the topics that comes up frequently is concerned with how we're doing in the technology department. Are our kids being exposed to the things that they need to know to survive and thrive in today's world?

The answer to that is a resounding YES! We are constantly and diligently working to upgrade and improve technology so that we can keep up with ever expanding expectations and we are very proud of where we are today.

Within the last three years, we have been able to replace almost all of the computer hardware in the school. Some highlights of the upgrades are as follows:

- Mounted multimedia projectors in every classroom.



- Mounted Smartboards in every elementary classroom and most secondary classrooms.

- New laptop computers for the entire teaching staff.
- New commercial wireless internet network throughout the school, church, and parish office building.
- 60 new desktop computers for our computer labs.
- New desktop computers in our media center and in our school office.

However, having all of this new technology in place is only half the story. We also ensure that teachers are trained

to utilize the technology available on a regular basis. Ways we keep our students involved with technology include the following:

- Required computer classes are part of the curriculum for students in grades 6-10.

- Approximately 70% of the senior class and 75% of junior class are taking an on-line dual enrollment course during the second semester. Students use the new computer labs for their on-line dual enrollment classes.

- Middle and high school students are using Microsoft Office 365 which enables them to access their files online 24 hours a day, seven days a week, even from their home computers.

- Students in grades 2-5 are using the "Type to Learn" keyboarding program regularly to work on their typing skills.

- Elementary teachers are constantly using their Smartboards to present lessons to their students and to encourage new, interactive ways to utilize technology within the classroom.

- St. Patrick School has a 'Bring Your Own Device' policy where students are allowed to bring their own devices and log them on to our wireless network. These devices are often used to do research for class projects.



One other question that parents often ask about is a computer teacher. We have 24 computer teachers. In a 21st century classroom, every teacher is essentially a computer teacher. Technology needs to be mainstreamed into the classroom on a regular basis. Among other things, our students type papers using Microsoft Word, present to their classmates using PowerPoint, and log statistics using Excel.

We have a very sound technology infrastructure at St. Patrick School. Technology is constantly being used in all of our classrooms from preschool all the way up to our senior class. The importance of our students learning, understanding, and using these tools is critical to their current and future success in life.


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Scrip Sales Continue to Increase

Participation in the scrip program at St. Patrick increased tremendously in 2014 with our overall volume up by \$177,000 over 2013. Our goal has always been to exceed \$1,000,000 in sales volume, and we're getting close to accomplishing it.

Although our primary participants continue to be school families, we have several alumni and friends who are now purchasing scrip and directing the proceeds into other accounts. Imagine what this parish could do if all Shamrock grandparents or local alumni would buy scrip cards for just their groceries and gas! What a gift that would be!



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Healing of the Body and the Soul

Russ Willemin is well-known to most people in the parish. He graduated from St. Patrick School, as did his three children. He has owned Willemin Chiropractic Center for more than 32 years.

In February 2014, Russ was diagnosed with urothelial carcinoma in his right kidney. On April 21, 2014 he had surgery to remove his right kidney, right ureter and right bladder cuff. The cancer had progressed to Stage IV and was in the lymphatics around his aorta, thus making it inoperable. Russ's prognosis was bleak. At the suggestion of a friend, Russ and his wife Kathy attended a healing service at Westphalia St. Mary, a service that literally changed their lives. Russ talks about his experience with great fervor and great emotion.

Last year was a life-changer for me. After my diagnosis and surgery, I was scheduled to begin a very aggressive chemotherapy on June 9. When I learned about the healing service on June 8, I decided to attend. Little did I know what a life-changer it would be.

Father Mathias Thelen spoke to us about preparing ourselves for whatever might happen. He suggested that we begin by forgiving any and all people against whom we were harboring ill will. What a liberating experience that was!

Then we prepared to go forward to ask for God's healing. As I approached, I prayed with all my heart that God would heal me of this cancer. I told him that I wanted to grow old with Kathy and to enjoy more time with my kids and grandkids. I made a covenant with God, deep in my heart, to do whatever he asked of me.

This was different from the "deals of the head" that I had made with God so many times through the years. In the past, I had asked for his favors, but when the rewards came through, I totally forgot about my end of the deal. This was a "covenant of the heart" and I was coming to him with as much sincerity as I had. But, I had failed so many times in the past, that I thought God had no reason to answer my prayers. I hadn't practiced my faith in years. I didn't pray regularly. In all honesty, I had grown pretty far from living in His presence or following His commandments.

This time felt different. I began to perspire uncontrollably, with my entire focus being on getting to the altar to be

prayed upon. By the time I got to Tom Naemi, I was soaked to the skin from perspiration. After stating to Tom my reason for being there, he put his hands on me and began to pray.

I went down. I couldn't open my eyes or move my body. Tom called four others to put their hands on me and pray. I could hear them all and I could feel their hands, but I couldn't move. I am not sure how long I laid there, but I clearly heard God telling me that I would recover from the cancer. He told me clearly, however, that it wouldn't be without consequence or without pain. I think that I had grown so far away from God that he had to get my attention.

It took a long time for me to be able to get up. My legs were stiff and trembling from spasms; I felt disoriented and couldn't stop crying. Even as I recovered enough to walk out of church, I couldn't fully understand or explain what had just happened to me. I couldn't discuss it for weeks without crying.

The next morning I started a very aggressive chemo plan at the University of Michigan Hospital in Ann Arbor.

That first night in Ann Arbor I was startled awake by a grotesque dark figure, right in my face. It was head and shoulders and neck. I bolted upright in bed in the dark, but it was still there. I pushed it away with my hands, then laid back down, breathing hard, trying to figure out what had just happened.

It reappeared again, just as close, and once again I sat up and pushed it away. The third time, as I pushed it away I shouted, "Get out of here!" It never returned again. I know that I faced the

devil and cast him away.

Within days, the nausea was unbelievable and the constipations was worse. I developed sores in my mouth that were so painful I could hardly eat. My immune system bottomed out during weeks two and three. These were the pain and consequences that God had foretold. I was miserable, but I realized that I wasn't afraid. I was okay.

I prayed multiple times each day and I began reading the bible. I was raised Catholic and had said the rosary thousands of times, but for the first time in my life I was praying it, thoughtfully and with conviction. The words I had spoken so many times now had a whole new meaning. My spiritual life had become so rich and so fulfilling that my physical discomforts were almost inconsequential.

By the end of cycle three of my chemotherapy, the CT scan showed the cancer was gone. The doctor was elated and kept telling me how lucky we were that the treatment was so effective. He was surprised by my calm, unexcited demeanor. He didn't realize that I had known for three months that I would hear this news and that I had been thanking God every day.

I strive now to stay in His presence all day every day. I recognize all of the gifts that he gives us and I think about how to best use those gifts. I praise Him every day, and I live without fear or darkness.

I went to Westphalia for a physical healing. I also received a spiritual healing. I thank God every day for this two-for-one.



New Coordinator Revitalizes Youth Program

God works in mysterious ways. When one door closes, another opens. Opportunity knocks at the strangest times.

All of these sayings can be applied to George Rutherford's path to his newest title, Coordinator of Youth Ministry at St. Pat's.

The Rutherfords became members of St. Patrick parish in 1993 and have been volunteering on school and parish events almost from day one. Twelve years ago, George began working with the youth ministry program, quickly developing an enthusiasm for the program.

When George decided to retire from healthcare after 33+ years, he didn't spend a lot of time wondering, "What now?" Instead, he became even busier with his volunteer work and also became a substitute teacher at St. Pat's. Last fall he was hired to be the Coordinator of Youth Ministry.

Since stepping into the lead role in the program, George has made it his mission to increase participation, while remembering that the focus of the program is to encourage and assist the young people on their own faith journeys.

Attendance at the meetings is creeping upward as the youth from Portland discover Mr. George. He's goofy, he's zany, he's serious and thoughtful. Most of all, he has a passion for leading them in the right direction.

High school youth ministry meets on Sunday evenings at 6:00 p.m. 7th/8th graders meet on Friday afternoons after school.

Both groups meet at the Christ in Action (C.I.A.) Headquarters, located in the Annex Building, corner of West and Center Streets.

The Faith Formation students have been busy this year learning about service---and putting that service into action!

Good Fathers Make Good Families

Pope Francis has declared this to be the Year of the Family, a proclamation that is most timely because the family, as it has been defined since the early days of humanity, is under attack.

In his weekly talk on January 28, 2015 Pope Francis called on fathers to be present in the lives of their children, pointing out that the absence of a father figure can have grave consequences. Sadly, he said, our modern societies are experiencing a crisis of fatherhood.

In the past it was common practice to perceive the father as authoritarian and at times even repressive. Today, he said, we sense uncertainty and confusion about the role of the father.

Pope Francis noted that without father figures, young people often feel orphaned and left adrift at a critical time of growth and development. Calling on fathers to be responsible, he said that fathers are necessary—to serve as good examples, and to guide their children in wisdom and virtue.

Society itself, he continued, has a similar responsibility to our youth. We cannot leave them as orphans, but need to provide them with ideals, sound values, hopes, and authentic spiritual fulfillment.

Pope Francis concluded in his address, that just as Jesus promised that he would not leave us orphans, we need to ask him in prayer to deepen and renew our appreciation of fatherhood and to raise up good fathers for the benefit of our families, our Church and our world.

Let us pray for the welfare of the family, as a unit consisting of a father, mother, and children, just as it is modeled for us by the Holy Family - Joseph, Mary, and the Child Jesus.

Let us work to make our families holy too.

Our Goals--Our Needs

One of the goals of the Athletic Association is to continue improving our facilities in both appearance and function. This goal boosts the image of the school and the athletic department, enhances the athletic experience, and provides a safe environment for the children of St. Patrick School.

With that said, in a recent basketball game in “The Pit” while a player was dribbling down the court, one of the floor tiles came loose and broke. The athletic director and custodial staff have been doing patch work on the floor for several years now. It is to the point where this 60+ year old floor is completely worn out and needs to be replaced.

Additionally, if the floor is replaced, the bleachers will need to be moved. These are also the original 60+ year old bleachers. The bleachers have been inspected each year, so they are safe to sit on and not in danger of collapse. But, they lack a lot of amenities that newer bleachers are required to have. We have only been permitted to continue using them because of a “grandfather clause.” If they are moved, then it is likely the grandfather clause will no longer be in effect.

An even more important factor in this discussion is the consideration of our fans, especially the very young and the seniors. It is very difficult to attend games at “The Pit” because of the large step up, the open foot design and no handrails.


LOST SHEEP
