
What Was Happening in 1966?

But, in second grade, Alex discovered a love for cheerleading that has taken her out of Portland and across the country over the last three years.

coached by Rebecca Judd. Elite Cheer is an affordable recreational cheerleading program that is part of the National Youth Activities Association They teach cheer (NYAA). jumps, stunting, basic tumbling, and dance. Members of the team have the option to compete in Champion Force competitions

The win in Myrtle Beach was bittersweet, as her biggest fan, grandpa Mitch (Butch) Bennett, wasn't there. Alex was Grandpa's sidekick, and he was her best friend. In March, he told her that because of a shattered disk in his back, he couldn't make the trip to South Carolina. In April, he was diagnosed with cancer, and he died on May 17. Alex had to compete without him, but she knew beyond the shadow of a doubt that, though she couldn't see him, Grandpa was there that day, watching her and cheering for her from the best seat in the house.





Judy Braley

Some people are kind and helpful by nature. They notice when others need assistance and are quick to offer a helping hand. Judy Braley is one of those people. When she asked sacristan Frances Layton, "Can I help you?" she had no way of knowing that her helping hand would be needed for the next 28 years. That didn't deter Judy from continuing to offer her services to other groups within the parish, as well. St. Pat's is a much better place for the time and effort that Judy and her husband Lyle put forth.

Judy (Pline) Braley graduated with honors from St. Patrick High School in 1958. It was during her junior year that she attended a movie at the Sun Theater with a group of girlfriends.

Lyle Braley was there that night, too. He was home on leave from the army, and he and a group of guys struck up a conversation with the young ladies. The conversation probably centered around Elvis Presley, who was quite popular at the time. Girls loved Elvis. Guys generally mocked him. Whatever the topic, the young men found reason to follow the girls to a local restaurant where they resumed talking.

That was the beginning of a partnership between Judy and Lyle that endures yet today, almost sixty years later.

Judy and Lyle were married the year after she graduated. Lyle was heading west to Washington for diesel mechanic classes, and Judy would be going along. Their wedding required a special dispensation to be held on a Friday night so that the young couple could leave on schedule.

They spent two years in Washington, came back to Michigan, and lived in Grand Ledge and Detroit (during the riots) before settling back in Portland. Along the way they had five children which led to nine grandchildren, and 11 great-grandchildren.

Twenty-eight years as a sacristan meant that Judy worked with lots of different people. She remembers a long and memorable line of dedicated priests that she served, each with his own special personality. Some of them were outgoing from the beginning; some were quieter and more reserved. One arrived in Portland on a Harley; another arrived on a bicycle. Each of them became a friend of the Braleys. Judy and Lyle still enjoy running into former pastors and associate pastors at churches around the diocese when they visit other parishes.

Over the years, Judy worked with many other sacristans, too. George Mleko, Tom Little, Jeri May, and Sandy Hornby are a few of the names that come to her mind. But there was one special sacristan who became a very dear friend.

Pat Hoppes and Judy became very close from working together at the church, and they enjoyed doing other things together, as well. Pat would pick her up, and off they would go. Lyle enjoyed the new friendship with Pat, too, because it gave him something that he'd never had before-some time to himself, away from his wife!

You see, Judy never learned how to drive, so Lyle takes her everywhere she needs to go. And, because of her volunteer schedule, her services have been needed frequently. As a result, if Judy is there, so is Lyle, who joins in and participates in most of her volunteer duties.

When Judy was asked to recall some special memories she talked about the time that Father Charlie Hall approached her after Mass and handed her an envelope. "What's in it?" she asked. "Is it my walking papers?"

Father Charlie just smiled and said it was something he thought she would like. It was tickets for Judy and Lyle and the other members of the Arts and Environment group to attend the Cathedral, as representatives of St. Patrick Church, to receive the holy oils for the Easter Vigil service. The gift was Father Charlie's way of saying, "Thank you for enhancing the Eucharistic celebration with so many beautiful adornments." Judy still remembers how honored she felt.

She also remembers the day that Sue Crosby asked her to help out with cookie deliveries to new parishioners. This ministry still exists today---good works live on.

But Judy says that the real joy comes when the church is empty and she walks into the sactuary in front of the altar

"I am excited for this change," said Mrs. Townsend. While it comes with a lot more responsibility, it also provides more clarity for everyone involved.


"Not being the sole administrator in the building is a bonus. It is great to have Randy to look to for guidance and support.

Catholic School Enrollment Increases



Elementary students at St. Pat's could hardly control their excitment to be back in school.

According to Dave Faber, Superintendent of Catholic Schools for the Diocese of Grand Rapids, Bishop Walkowiak's plan to increase enrollment and strengthen resources at Catholic schools in the diocese is bearing fruit. Preschool enrollment for the 2015-16 school year was up 1.6%; enrollment for 2016-17 is up an additional 1.5%.

Enrollment at St. Patrick School has followed the same trend. Enrollment for 2015-16 was up 1.5%; enrollment for 2016-17 is up nearly 3%. Our total student enrollment as of September 15, 2016, was 392 students in preschool through 12th grades.

Bishop Walkowiak wants to remind all families in the Diocese of Grand Rapids who do not currently have their children enrolled at Catholic schools, that Welcome Scholarships are available. Every child in your family will qualify: Preschool \$750, K-8th \$750, and High School \$1000 per student. Applications are available at www. dioceseofgrandrapids.org/schools.





They faced the Fowler Eagles in the first game of the districts, coming out on top by a score of 1-0 in eight innings. They won the district title by finishing off Fulton 10-0 in just six innings. The next two

games in the regionals saw the Shamrocks win two more victories over Saginaw Michigan Lutheran Seminary and Bay City All Saints.

By the time they reached the quarterfinal game, they were feeling more confident, but they knew that they'd have

The semifinal game was held at Michigan State University McLane Stadium on a hot Friday afternoon. Freshman Nathan Lehnert pitched six shutout innings; senior Travis Moyer came in and finished it out. The Shamrocks won by a score of 2-0.

For the fourth time in school history and the first time since 1993, the Shamrock baseball team would play in the state finals.

Unfortunately, the run for the championship didn't end the way they wanted. St. Patrick faced Sterling Heights Parkway Christian, who belted out 13 hits and scored in every inning except the first and fourth. A five-run rally in the second inning proved to be too much for the Shamrocks to handle, and the final score was 3-10.



St. Patrick School Board Establishes Development Committee

The St. Patrick School Board created a new committee last spring to assist with development/fundraising goals and objectives. The Development/Fundraising Committee is co-chaired by Michael Wolfston and Melissa Schrauben.

Michael Wolfston is from Lansing, and just retired as the Executive Director of the Foundation for Catholic Secondary Education (FCSE) for the Diocese of Grand Rapids when he was asked to join the St. Patrick School Board as co-chair of the new Development Committee. Under Michael's leadership the FCSE raised over \$1,800,000.00 in tuition assistance allowing over 1,000 students the opportunity to receive a Catholic secondary education. Michael firmly believes that no child should be denied a Catholic school education because of a lack of financial resources!

Prior to serving as the Executive Director of the FCSE, Michael also worked as Executive Director of the Burcham Hills Foundation in East Lansing, raising over \$10,000,000 to assist with elder care; was the National Funds Director for the VFW National Children's Home in Eaton Rapids, raising \$5,000,000 to support the operational needs of the home; and he worked at St. Vincent Catholic Charities in Lansing, overseeing and leading the merger with Catholic Charities in 1985.

Melissa (Schneider) Schrauben has lived in Portland her entire life and attended St. Patrick School from kindergarten through graduation in 2007. Her husband, Luke, also attended St. Patrick School. The Schraubens have two young children. Their older son entered St. Patrick School this fall as a preschooler.

Melissa graduated from Grand Valley State University in 2011, with a Bachelor's degree in Clinical Exercise Science. She went on to Michigan State University to complete her Master's degree in Public Health (2014). She is currently employed with the State of Michigan.

The primary function of this committee is to direct and organize a comprehensive development plan for the school including raising money for immediate scholarships and needs, coordinating planned and legacy giving, and helping to organize fundraising efforts for St. Patrick School.

What is Development? Development is an integral part of the success of St. Patrick School. Many non-profits, particularly smaller charities, operate without a development/fundraising plan. When someone has a fundraising idea, these organizations tend to throw together a committee or volunteer group and go for it. Instead of having a long-term development plan in place, they oftentimes send out a letter here and there, conduct some donor meetings, and keep moving along until the bank account runs low and they go into "panic mode" racing around trying to find money to keep the doors open. This is not the best way to run a development program and is the reason the Development Committee was created for St. Patrick School.

What will the Development Committee do? The new Develop-

ment Committee has been charged with the responsibility of developing a comprehensive, well-written development/fundraising plan. While not a guaranteed roadmap to success, a development plan sets goals that promote growth and create ownership among the whole fundraising team. A development

plan also prevents the need for crisis fundraising, which will enable St. Patrick School to track its progress and identify problems as they arise. St. Patrick School will be able to proactively set and balance priorities and avoid competing timelines with other school fundraisers and other local non-profit organizations.



What strategies will we

- 1. Put in place the appropriate systems, policies, and procedures to support a comprehensive fundraising/development program
- 2. Provide training for all volunteers on the development staff
- 3. Establish a board-level strategic fund development committee (already in progress)
- 4. Set up a management information system that maintains quality information about donors and prospects (in progress)
- 5. Engage staff, committees, and the board in strategic conversation to support quality decisions
- 6. Build a culture of philanthropy throughout the St. Patrick School community

- She has also worked for the Diocese of Lansing as Marriage Preparation Program Developer and instructor since 2005.




Reunion Reports



Father Van Lente Celebrates Golden Jubilee

Father Richard Van Lente was the pastor at Portland St. Patrick Parish from 1984-1990. While he was here, I worked with him on several projects, one of which I remain heavily involved in today, this newsletter.

It was 30 years ago that I received a phone call from Father Van Lente and Principal Deacon Dale Hollern asking if I would be willing to do a little job. Father Van Lente and Deacon Dale thought that we should update our alumni list and put together a newsletter to send out to all of our graduates, to let them know what was happening at the school. That was the birth of The Shamrock. I had no idea that I'd still be doing it 30 years later!

I also had no way of knowing that Father Van Lente would become my brother-inlaw a few years later, when I married his brother, Bob, whom I met at Father's 25-year Silver Jubilee.

For many of you, your knowledge of Father V, was from church each week, here or at any of the other 15 assignments he fulfilled in the past 50 years.

You know that he is a gifted homilist. The thing I enjoyed most was that Father would place the gospels against the backdrop of the geopolitical climate of those times. It enriched the messages and made them feel much more real.

However, once the stole, chasuble, and alb were hung up after Mass, many of us were treated to the other aspects of Father V. We might have gone hunting rabbits or pheasants with him, gone flying with him, or spent time talking, while enjoying a glass of wine and a good meal. Father follows the example set by Jesus: If you want people to listen to you, feed them well first.

Father V., like Jesus, found that a gathering of people, enjoying a great meal, was a fine setting for talking about something you might want to consider doing. You know, small things like joining a project committee or heading up a building expasion.

Father V. is one of those people who can see in each individual their

potential to do things that they'd never consider themselves. He'd get us revved up with an inspiring homily and then one-on-one encourage us to step up to the plate. We might not have known how to do what he was asking, but after talking with him, we felt like somehow we could do it. And most of the time he was right. He helped many of us grow this way.

Through his actions, he not only inspired us as individuals, but he also helped to inspire and shape whole communities.

While serving as pastor in Grand Rapids, he suggested that the surplus chili from a parish dinner be taken downtown to the homeless and served to them. It was done on a regular basis from the back of a truck until the city shut them down. The battle with the city brought about change, and was the start of what is today, God's Kitchen, which provides thousands of daily meals every year in the Heartside Neighborhood of Grand Rapids.

Father served those in jail with regular visits; he also became the Chaplain of the Newaygo State Police Post, serving as spiritual advisor to the troopers. On and off he has spent years in Mexico and Central America

in the missions, serving people in the most rural communities who felt honored to have him there.

He also inspired us with a constant pursuit of education. Already possessing a BA in Philosophy and Classical Languages and a Master of Divinity degree, after his 25th ordination anniversary he traveled to France to the University of Louvain to continue to earn degrees in Canon and European Civil Law and a Master's in Moral and Religious Science.

He was about to enter the doctoral program when he was summoned back to West Michigan by the bishop to take the place of a pastor who had taken seriously ill in the little community of Fremont. This temporary assignment would last for 12 years. But during that time he was able to finally complete that doctorate through the Graduate Theological Foundation.

As inadequate as these words are to describe what he has done for all of us these past 50 years, we thank you, Father Van Lente, for your service to God, to our faith, to our diocese, to our communities, and to each and every one of us. May God bless you with a rich reward always.

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
