Shamrock Football Philosophy Building good Catholic Men

In recent years, there has been a discernible change happening at St. Patrick's School and Parish. An authentic Catholic identity is being recaptured, led by a revitalized staff, an influx of large, devout Catholic families, and the influence of the Holy Spirit working among us. One of the most obvious of these changes has been noticed within the football program at St. Patrick's. Shamrock football fans are noticing encouraging signs of growth from the players, coaches, and their families, and it has drawn attention to our incredible school. People have noticed the difference within our program. This is the story about the change.

Three seasons ago, Head Coach and Athletic Director Pat Russman was presented with the difficult challenge of replacing veteran defensive coordinator Al Schrauben upon his retirement from football, along with the loss of his other assistants. The daunting task of replacing such a valuable staff left him with some decisions to make. Ultimately, Coach Russman decided that he would hire men who were strong in their faith first, and knowledgeable about football second. Not to say that his choices

for his assistant coaches were ignorant of football, but more importantly, they were men who would put their faith ahead of all other considerations when mentoring and coaching young men. Coach Russman chose to hire Ben Cross, a longtime coach in the Shamrock program, as his Defensive Coordinator; Aaron Thelen, a teacher at St. Patrick's and multi sport coach; and Todd Davlin, a youth football coach at St. Patrick's. Along with long time booth men, Mike Coyne and Ross Schneider, the staff is fully committed to

their faith.

St. Patrick's has had a very successful football history and has been even more successful since moving to 8-man football in 2012, leading to a 60-12 record since that time. Everybody loves to win, but the coaches at St. Pat's decided that there are far more important things than just winning games. Prayer was already part of the team concept, so throughout the first season, the coaches didn't change things a great deal. The real breakthrough for the staff came during the Lenten/Easter season in early 2017. The coaches all went to the Paschal Triduum, attending the Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Vigil masses out of love for God and passion for their Catholic Faith. In the discussions that ensued in the off-season, the staff determined that they were going to go all-in on raising a Catholic team and really embracing their faith.

The staff has identified that the main reason they work at St. Pat's,

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Student Spotlight

Danica Ginther

Danica Ginther is a fifth-grade student at St. Pat's. She has been a student there since she started in preschool. As her Dad, I am biased about her accomplishments and great things she has achieved, literally since before her birth.

Her Mom was hospitalized at 14 weeks due to premature labor. Mom was on total bed rest for a month, meaning Miss Danica could be born any day.

At 24 weeks and 4 days, she was born, weighing in at a whopping 1 lb 12 oz and measuring 13 inches long. She was on every machine imaginable to keep her alive and help her continue to grow. She had heart surgery at about three weeks old and continued to grow for 94 days in neonatal intensive care. She came home at just shy of 5 lbs. About 1 month later she went through eye surgery to reattach her retinas in both eyes.

Fast forward to the present. Of all the medical problems she was supposed to have because of her early birth, she hasn't had any issues as of this time. She has been in gymnastics, various dance classes, and tennis. She finally settled into Irish Dancing with the Hubbardston Irish Dance Troupe and travels with them to many events. She also got involved in Tae Kwon Do and worked her way up through the ranks to 1st Degree Black Belt in December 2017. Along the way she competed in many tournaments medaling in all but one she entered. In doing so she became the Michigan State Champion in two of four categories of competition for Black Belt recommended girls of her age group.

If that were not enough, she is becoming a fine young lady that continues to make her family very proud.

For the past 30 years, she has travelled far from home, rubbed shoulders with the rich and famous, and had adventures more numerous than the most ardent globetrotter. But, she always comes home, though sometimes it's just long enough to catch her breath and to prepare herself for the next quest. In 2012, Anne moved to the Marshall Islands and taught English to Marshallese, Filipino, Taiwanese, and Micronesian college students. She enjoyed constant 80-degree weather, year-round 6:30 am sunrises and 6:30 pm sunsets, and amenities like electricity and running water 80% of the time.

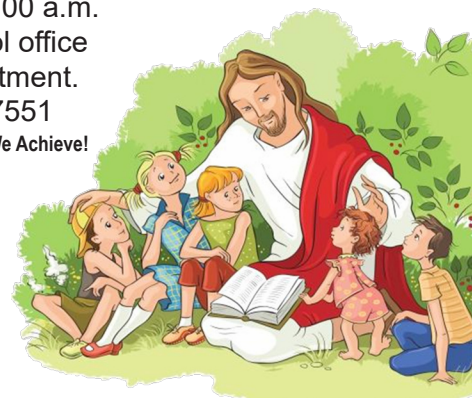

There are some great things happening at St. Patrick Church. Faith Formation is flourishing!

For the last few years, the *Ignite* and *RCIA* programs have been the backbone of our Adult Faith Formation. While we continue to provide *Ignite* special events and a dynamic *RCIA* program that will bring thirteen individuals into the Catholic Faith this Easter, we are working hard to offer you more to renew and deepen your faith.

This year, your opportunity to grow multiplied with the addition of six brand-new ministries, a new multimedia resource, and a vibrant parish mission that followed the successful *Padre Pio* mission of last year. These include the following:

ALPHA premiered in September with a group of 55 participants. *Alpha* is a series of sessions exploring the Christian faith. Each talk looks at a different question around faith and is designed to create conversation. *Alpha* has been experienced by thousands around the globe, and everyone is welcome. Evenings include dinner, discussion, and community.

SYMBOLON builds on the success of *Alpha*. Combining a stunning video series, teaching, and discussion, it presents the big picture of the Catholic Faith. Like *Alpha*, each evening begins with dinner and a warm, welcoming environment. Both *Symbolon* and *Alpha* are offered on Monday evenings 6:30 p.m.-8:00 p.m. in the Parish Hall. No registration is required.

LIT (Ladies in Truth). For over six months, ladies of all ages and backgrounds have met to build a new women's ministry in our parish. All ladies are invited to pray together, encourage one another, build friendships, and encounter the living Christ. *LIT* meets in room 110 of the school, Saturday mornings 8:30 a.m.- 10 a.m.

THAT MAN IS YOU. For over twelve years, we have supported a thriving Saturday-morning men's group. Taking their lead from Fr. Mike, these men launched a new program this Lent. *That Man is You* honestly addresses the pressures and temptations that men face in our modern culture, especially those relating to their roles as husbands and fathers. All men are encouraged to participate in the Lenten Journey portion, with a full program launch to begin in September 2019. Men's Group meets Saturday mornings 6:30-8:00 a.m. in the Parish Hall.

BELOVED. Prior to this year, our parish lacked a truly comprehensive Marriage-preparation program. *Beloved* addresses that need. *Beloved* asks our engaged couples to explore the true meaning of Marriage and how to live it out together. Led by mentor couples from within our Marriage Enrichment Team, they discover the deepest spiritual, emotional, and practical realities of Marriage through Scripture, Tradition, and Church Teaching. This year, over twenty engaged couples benefited from *Beloved*.

REBORN. Our parish also needed to offer more to parents preparing for the Baptism of their child. In June of this year, we initiated *Reborn*. *Reborn* explains the deeply personal and sacred relevancy of baptism. With a step-by-step explanation of the rite itself, including its place in Scripture and Tradition, *Reborn* shows how Baptism reveals the heart of God's love for His children.

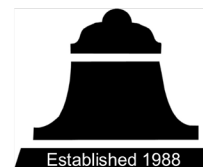

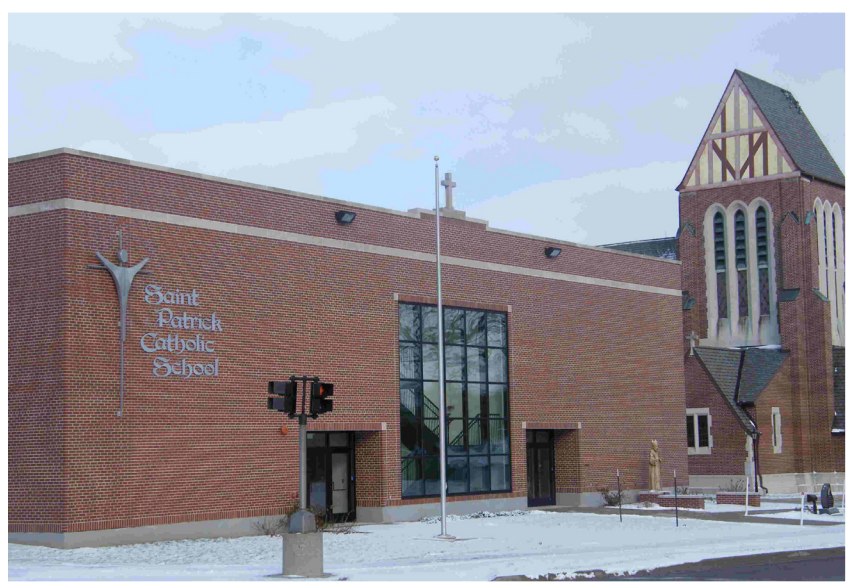

Dealing With an Aging Roof

St. Patrick School is aging. The original part of the building was constructed in the early 1950s with additions in the 1960s and 1990s. The building has held up remarkably well, due in no small part to the Herculean efforts of the maintenance staff.

Now is the time to upgrade and protect our assets so St. Patrick Church and School can continue quality education, share wisdom, and provide a safe environment for our students to hear the word of the Lord.

The school's roof has not undergone any major repairs, rehabilitations, or renovations since the original construction of each building phase. Parts of the roof are now 65+ years old. Minor repairs have been made, but these have been a temporary, not a long-term, solution.

We have far surpassed the life expectancy of the roof. It has been leaking for way too long and has lost most of its insulating value (R-value). This quite literally means most of the heat is going through the roof.

The Plants and Grounds Committee has been evaluating roof replacement options which includes a long-term rehabilitation plan that will increase the R-value to meet the existing Energy Code and will offer almost four times the current long-term thermal resistance (LTTR) of the existing roof system. This option will offer a 20-year warranty and will have a life expectancy of 30 years. Preliminary estimates exceed \$240,000 and funding is needed in order to move forward.

The roof protects every single investment made inside the school and NOW is the time to address the situation.

Good Things are Happening Already!

SOUND SYSTEM: Due to generous donations by the family of a St. Patrick student, there will soon be a new sound system in the gym. The equipment has arrived and is scheduled to be installed during spring break. The new digital system can be operated from a computer or tablet. It will provide wireless technology and a better listening experience for Drama Club productions, NHS ceremonies, graduations, and more.

OUTDOOR LIGHTING: Through the God-given skills and professional connections of a school family, the lighting on the west side of the school was recently upgraded at no cost to the school or parish. The new lights provide a much brighter outdoor experience for the West Street area. Thank you to Jerry Bozung, Mike Bozung, Braden Bozung, Charlie Bozung, and Troy Smith for obtaining and installing the new lights.

SECURITY GRANT: St. Pat's was one of five recipients of a security grant funded by the Michigan State Police. We were the only recipient to receive the maximum award of \$100,000.

The grant requires a lot of paperwork which is in the process of being completed with hopes that the safety improvements can be completed before the beginning of the next school year. Plans are to fully replace and install new doors at the gym and office entrances and refurbish two secondary doors. Plans also include expanding the electronic access system that we invested in last year, and we are seeking options to add security cameras around the facility.

Thank you to school parent, Heather Hendges-Davis, for writing the grant application and following through with the necessary paperwork. If you know of other grants that are available, please contact the school or parish office.

and their children attend the school is because they want to become better Catholic men themselves. This leads to a mission of evangelization and mentoring of the young men in the parish, thereby building better young men. Football is an excellent tool to facilitate that mission. Winning football games is a byproduct of their mission, but winning is not the mission.

As coaches, fathers, and Catholic men, nothing pleases the coaches more than knowing that they are promoting their Catholic faith and giving the young athletes opportunities to take ownership of their choices and to discover the sense of self worth that comes from trying to be an upright man.

One of the changes the coaches have instituted is three weekly goals. Each athlete writes out his goals and they discuss them as a team.

Athletic Goal—How do you become a better football athlete? Pick something that is going to improve your skills as a player. Things like extra push-ups or sit-ups, or extra sprints at practice, etc.

Team Goal—How do you become a better teammate? Choose something that is going to make you a better teammate. It may be making sure the football shed is swept up and cleaned for the week. It may be making sure to talk to every teammate after or before practice.

Man Goal—How do I become a better Catholic man? This one extends to the community and home. You have to pick something you will work on that week that will make me a better Catholic man. The coaches state that this one usually takes the most effort. Oftentimes men have to humble

themselves and slow down enough to make this work. This goal often involves identifying ways to serve others.

Many parents, grandparents, and community members have noticed these young men setting their cell phones down and spending time talking to their parents, complimenting their mother or father on dinner that night, raking leaves for a stranger, spending time with a grandparent, and other things that help make the world a better place.

All of these goals are unique to the individual, and if done right, allows them to get pride out of the way, and to take ownership of their actions and work to become better Catholic men. At the end of the week, the players and coaches gather to discuss how each individual did in accomplishing these goals.

Other activities that have instituted by the coaching staff:

- Endeavor to show class and sportsmanship throughout the game, playing a very aggressive game with respect for our opponent.
- Make a point of hitting our opponent hard but help them back up every time.
- Have athletes pray in Eucharistic Adoration as a team.
- Pray the rosary as a team before each game.

They have also relearned the St. Michael prayer to help them defeat their weaknesses as men.

The staff has been repaid by their efforts. Dozens of times in the past few seasons they have been blessed with the obvious fruits of their evangelization to other teams. Opponents notice their obvious faith and the respect shown to them, and it inspires them to return that respect. They have had many reports from other school administrators, coaches, and fans who notice how our school families and our athletes carry themselves. The coaches find this to be very rewarding, indeed.

The Shamrock Coaches Say:

Coach Pat Russman: "It did not happen overnight, and we are not done improving. As Catholics much of what we profess is counter-cultural and hard for these men to embrace fully. I am blessed to be part of this team, and its core purpose humbles me and pushes me to be a better man. I look forward to seeing how far our men can take this mission."

Coach Todd Davlin: "I love being with the boys. I cherish every moment with my son, but the reason I keep coaching is to pray with young men. We pray before practice. We pray after practice. We pray before games in the locker room, on the bus, on the field, and then on the field when the game is over. We pray the rosary as a team, and we commit to Adoration a few times a year as a team. Prayer changes all of us, boys and coaches, for the better. The football field is a great place for learning self discipline, working as a team, facing fear, and suffering through the inevitable setbacks that come with life. Prayer is the glue that binds it all together and keeps things in the right perspective. When Jeff was a little boy, we were driving home from practice, and he told me his favorite places in the world are St. Patrick's Church, Father Flohe Field, and home."

Coach Aaron Thelen: "This team works its tail off to be better football players, better students, and better men. Their commitment to self improvement in every aspect is inspiring to anyone who is around them."

Coach Ben Cross: "I can only repeat the words of Pope Benedict XVI, '*The world offers you comfort, but you were not made for comfort, you were made for greatness.*' I would also like to express my gratitude to Bishop Walkowiak for sending us our new Pastor Fr. Mike Alber. His focus on exercising the Catholic Virtues as men is particularly valuable to our mission as Catholic athletes and he has assisted us immensely with his wisdom and strong teaching."

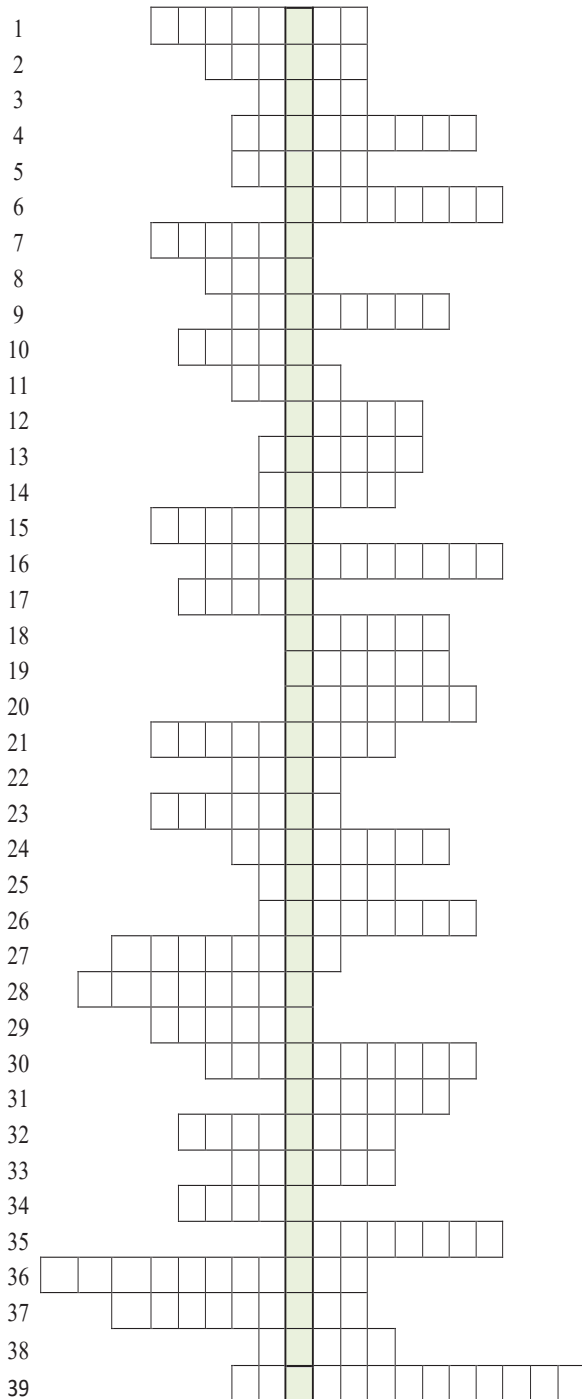

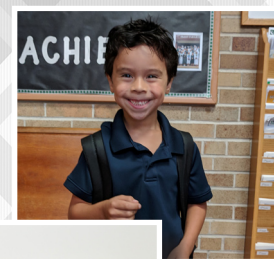
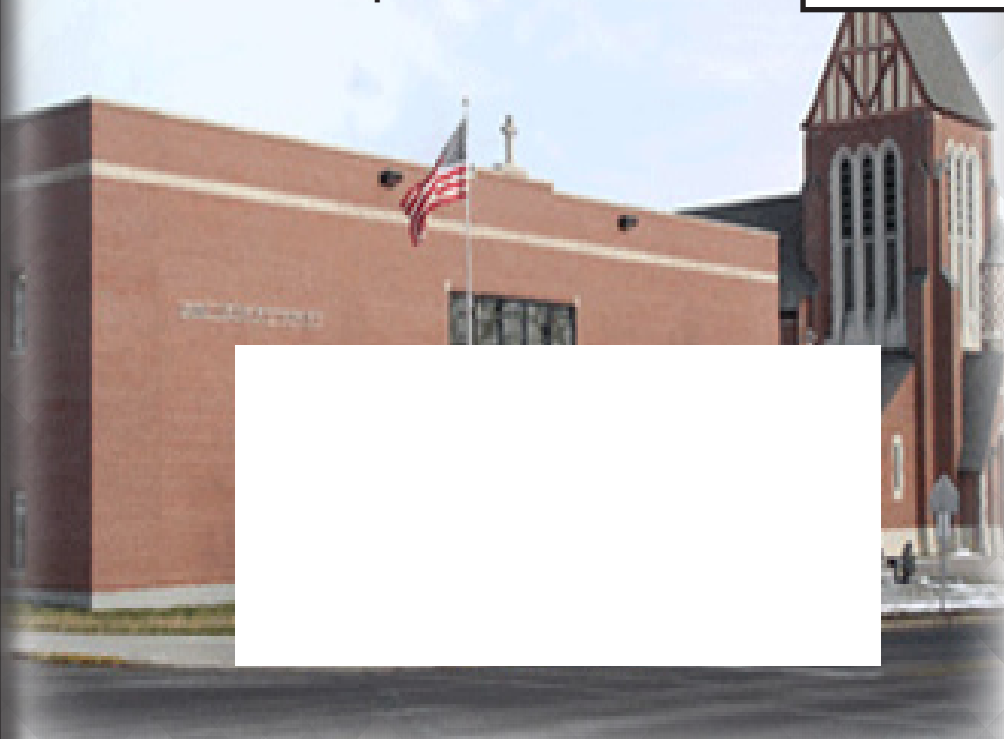
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
