On May 19, St. Patrick School said goodbye to the Class of 2019 as they ended an outstanding school career. Here are some of their major accomplishments:

- •13 of the 25 students were members of the National Honor Society.
- •14 were recognized as CMAC Scholar Athletes, meaning they had at least a 3.4 GPA and lettered in at least two sports, one of which was in their senior year.
- •24 out of the 25 plan to go on to higher education with one student taking a gap year before going to university.
- •Three signed a National Letter of Intent to participate in college athletics.
- •15 graduated with honors (3.79 GPA or higher) with six of those having a weighted 4.0 GPA or higher. 24 had a GPA of 3.0 or higher.
- •They were offered a total of \$786,430 in scholarship money. They accepted approximately \$534,295 of that money from the colleges and universities they plan on attending.

PLANTS AND GROUND COMMITTEE IS GETTING IT DONE

St. Patrick Parish and School has a new plants and grounds committee that is overseeing the facilities. They have been very busy. Recently the following projects were completed thanks to your generous donations:

- A new sound system was installed in the school gymnasium.
- A hot water heater was installed in the school cafeteria.
- A new science lab table, thanks to a mini-grant from the Father Flohe Foundation, was installed in the high school science classroom.
- Work has been completed to refurbish the church sanctuary with the original, tabernacle and crucifix.
- The pole barn at Father Flohe Field that was destroyed by the tornado has been rebuilt.
- A new roof has been installed on the school.
- A new boiler was installed in the newer portion of the school. Last winter, one of the boilers failed.
- The sign designating the school office entrance has been relocated to be more "eye-level" and noticeable to visitors.
- A new storm door was installed at the parish office.

There are several projects that have been started or are in the planning stages. These include:

- Replacing all kneelers in the church (estimated cost \$23,000).
- Replacing two aging copy machines in the school that no longer have replacement parts available (estimated cost \$10,290 per machine).
- Remodeling the approach to the main entrance of the school so it meets American with Disabilities Act (ADA) standards (estimated cost \$13,000).
- LED lighting upgrades for the parking lot and driveway in between the church and school.
 This will provide better safety for the school and greater illumination of the church & parish hall handicap entrances.
- The stained-glass window near the west church entrance (facing the courtyard) will see

- repairs, as well as the addition of new tempered glass for protective measure and to save on heat loss.
- Bids for upgrades thanks to our Michigan State Police security grant are under evaluation by the committee. Due to timing required for federal approvals and Michigan State Police oversight, work will now be completed during the school year.
- Prep work is being completed on the parish properties along Grape Street that will be up for sale soon.
- The project to replace the gym floor has started with the goal of having everything completed by the end of September.

We are very excited with all the great things that are currently happening at St. Patrick Parish and School. We are also thankful and appreciative for those who have been generous with their time, talents and financial support. We are especially thankful for the members of the plants and grounds committee that have been behind the planning of all that is being completed. While we are thrilled with all that has been accomplished, we are ready to roll up our sleeves and get to work on all that yet needs to be completed. If you would like to join us, please feel free to contact the parish to share your expertise on any of the aforementioned projects with our plants and grounds committee or be generous with any financial support, which can be earmarked for any projects you feel would be the best investment of your money. We welcome prayers for both our parish and school. We must be good stewards of the resources we have to ensure our church and school are not only available for our current generations but for many generations yet to come.

HOW TO LEAVE A LEGACY THROUGH THE FATHER FLOHE FOUNDATION

What Is Planned Giving?

Planned giving is also referred to as gift planning or legacy giving. It enables individuals to make larger gifts to charitable organizations than they could make from ordinary income. Some planned gifts provide lifelong income to the donor. Other gift plans use estate and tax planning to provide for charity and heirs in ways that maximize the gift and/or minimize its impact on the donor's estate.

Thus, by definition, a planned gift is any major gift, made in a lifetime or at death as part of a donor's overall financial and/or estate planning. These include gifts of equity, life insurance, real estate, personal property, or cash. By contrast, gifts to annual appeals are made from a donor's discretionary income, and while they may be budgeted for, they are not planned. Whether a donor uses cash, appreciated securities/stock, real estate, artwork, partnership interests, personal property, life insurance, a retirement plan, etc., the benefits of funding a planned gift can make this type of charitable giving very attractive to both the donor and charity.

What are the tax benefits of planned gifts?

- Donors can contribute appreciated property, like securities or real estate, receive a charitable deduction for the full market value of the asset, and pay no capital gains tax on the transfer.
- Gifts payable to charity upon the donor's death, like a bequest or a beneficiary designation in a life insurance policy or retirement account, do not generate a lifetime income tax deduction for the donor, but they are exempt from estate tax.

What is the mission of the Father Flohe Foundation?

The Father Flohe Foundation's mission is simply to ensure the stability of St Patrick as a K-12 school for future generations. Since it's humble beginnings, the Foundation has been able to contribute nearly \$1,700,000 to support the operating needs of St Patrick Catholic School. The

ESTABLISHING YOUR FAMILY'S SCHOLARSHIP

No child should be denied a Catholic faith-based education because their parents or guardians do not have the financial means to pay their tuition. The Diocese of Grand Rapids and its schools strive to provide an exceptional educational experience in which all children can flourish. We partner with parents to awaken the whole child to a world of light and life – that grows better and brighter when children reach their potential. You trust St. Patrick to provide not only a wonderful education but also to reinforce the morals and values you set in your home. We care about your students both now, as they mature into their adult life, and in the future as they look to eternal life.

In order to assist our current families and those families who would like to send their children to St. Patrick School but are facing financial hardships St. Patrick School, in conjunction with the Father Flohe Foundation, is establishing the St. Patrick School Scholarship Program.

It is the intent of this program to establish as many endowed educational scholarships as possible, where a portion of the accumulated interest is returned annually in the form of student scholarships.

This is how it will work:

- This scholarship will be financially managed by the Father Flohe Foundation which will pay back 4% of the accumulated interest annually for scholarship use, consequently the larger the principal invested in the scholarship the more interest available for scholarships.
- Scholarships may be set up in honor of a loved one, in memory of a loved one, to support an educational program (STEM, social studies, religious studies, math studies, etc.
 Scholarships may also be set up to provide financial resources for educational equipment, e.g. computer or classroom equipment, etc.)
- Families or businesses that establish a scholarship will receive an annual financial statement showing the financial situation of

- that scholarship.
- The individual or family establishing the scholarship will work with the high school and elementary principals in establishing the criteria needed to award the scholarship on an annual basis.
- The minimal amount to establish a named scholarship is \$25,000, payable over five years.
- To apply for a scholarship, students and families will be asked to submit an online application by the end of January of each year. The principals and a representative of the Father Flohe Foundation will review all applications and award the scholarships in March of each year. Please note that no cash will be exchanged, scholarships will be credited towards the tuition account of the student awarded the scholarship.
- If enough interest is earned scholarships will be awarded to more than one student.
- There will be a scholarship awards dinner on an annual basis for the donor who established the scholarship and the scholarship recipient to meet and discuss the student's educational goals and objectives.

Providing access to education through scholarships is increasingly important, as you assist students in realizing their educational dreams and reaching their fullest potential. Your gifts to unrestricted scholarships not only provide financial support for our student's educations, but they are also an investment in their future.
