St. Pat's Alum Named CEO

At the January meeting of the Board of Directors, Chris O'Neill was promoted by unanimous vote to the position of Manager/CEO of Homeworks Tri-County Electric Cooperative. Homeworks is a member-owned electric utility, serving about 26,000 homes and businesses in mid-Michigan. They also offer propane and are currently building a high-speed fiber internet network.



Chris graduated from St. Patrick School in 2001, and within months of his graduation, was hired to do filing at Homeworks while also attending Lansing Community College where he was taking medical anthropology classes. Chris vividly remembers his interview at Homeworks, as it took place the same week as 9-11.

A few months later, he was approached by Pat Essner, the Customer Service Manager, with the suggestion that he apply for an opening in the Customer Service Department. "Why me?" Chris asked. "Because you're broke and you need it," said Pat.

As he moved into the full-time job in customer service, Chris was also keeping his eyes open for ways to work his way up in the company. He loved working for Homeworks and knew that he wanted to advance his career there.

Over the next four years, Chris applied for 6-8 jobs, and finally, was hired to be the dispatcher for the Electrical Operations Department, which led to taking on responsibilities for mapping, GIS, and utility safety. Small businesses present opportunities to their employees to fill needs within the organization, and Chris became adept at stepping in to help wherever those needs arose. He also became adept at juggling a variety of duties.

In 2006 he was promoted to be the First Safety Coordinator. Two years after that, a position in the Automated Metering Department opened and he took on those duties, as well. Soon after, he became involved in cyber security,

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In the Spotlight

Craig Huhn

Craig Huhn graduated from St. Patrick School in 1994. He and his wife, Kellie, live in Holt, and Craig teaches math at Holt High School where their daughter Audrey is a freshman. When The Shamrock heard about Craig's venture into writing, we contacted him about this spotlight article. Here, in his own words, is his story.



I graduated from St. Pat's in 1994, and, having been inspired by a bunch of great teachers, I decided to go to college for education. I initially intended to teach history, but when it came time to choose a major and minor, I decided that I'd major in mathematics and minor in history so I didn't have so many papers to write. At Michigan State, they require you to get a degree in your content area and then do a full fifth year of student teaching. Into my senior year, I still fully intended to be a high school history teacher, where I could facilitate conversations about some of the deep conundrums and consequences of controversial decisions throughout history that have shaped our world. Little did I know that MSU would place me into a methods course in that fourth year based on my major, so I was enrolled in a course on how to teach middle and high school mathematics.

It was here where I felt like my eyes were opened to a whole new world. I saw a way of approaching education in secondary mathematics where the students were involved in actually thinking and sharing their ideas, conjecturing and wondering, and figuring things out for themselves rather than listening to a teacher or professor relay the thinking that other people have already done. Thinking about how this could look gelled with what I envisioned for discussions in history class, and it was exciting to learn about all the work that was being done to research and improve math education. I quickly became passionate about this vision, and was really excited when my internship placement was at the lab school that had been partnered with MSU to work on and learn about this together.

My internship at Holt High School took place in 1998-1999, and I was fortunate to be offered a job there the following year. Between my training and education in math ed from MSU and being immersed in a professional culture of Holt High

School's math department, I began to recognize that teaching mathematics well (with my new idea of what that actually meant) had started to feel like a moral obligation. And part of that obligation was to continue to improve, study, learn, and share as part of a larger professional community.

So, in addition to working really hard to create experiences for students to help them understand mathematics, I was also in a place where I learned how to engage and collaborate professionally. Over time, this led to invitations to present at conferences, consult for curricula, work on research, and contribute to the literature in math ed. Ironically, my quest to avoid writing papers in college has ended up with me writing articles and chapters in books about teaching, and most recently, a book about our struggles and successes working to get more kids to learn more math.

I hadn't intended to do anything that ended up as a book about teaching math, but someone I had worked with previously at MSU had some ideas for putting something together that might be useful to an audience of teachers trying to initiate changes in their districts or buildings to be more consistent with best practices. Piece by piece over a school year and then with some intensive work over the summer, Dr. Steele and I collaborated on authoring Holt's story about rethinking the teaching of mathematics and what it's meant to me as a teacher. *A Quiet Revolution* came out from Information Age Publishing in 2018, and has given me opportunities to talk to teachers across the country about the pressures, surprises, pitfalls, and successes in the evolution of our understanding of how students learn mathematics.

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St. Pat's STEAM Program Takes a New TRAC

As a member of Portland St. Patrick's teaching staff, I am proud to announce the implementation of a new hands-on experience and PBL (project-based learning) program. With our new hardware, our students have had the opportunity to participate in a state-funded competition.

TRAC (Transportation and Civil Engineering) is an educational program sponsored by MDOT (Michigan Department of Transportation) and designed for integration into science, math, and social science. TRAC has seven modules which engage students in solving real-world problems while connecting them to the work world of transportation. The TRAC curriculum is aligned with the National Standards for Math and Science and offers expanded activities such as a statewide Design & Build Bridge Challenge and internships for graduating high school seniors.

The MDOT Design and Build Bridge Challenge creates an opportunity for TRAC teachers to enter their students into the world of engineering.

To participate in the challenge students are required to write an engineering proposal, very similar to the work consultants do to secure engineering services. Students who submit complete proposals are invited to participate at the statewide bridge challenge. At the challenge, students test their bridge prototype for strength-to-weight ratios and provide a presentation, summarizing the entire competition process. The combination of the proposal writing, bridge testing, and delivery of a presentation provides 7th

to 12th grade students a complete engineering experience that simulates components within the civil engineering industry.

With the professional help of Heather Davis, we were able to purchase five new computers that have the capacity to run sophisticated CAD (Computer-Aided Design/Drafting) programs. The funds to purchase the computers were donated by Sharron Davis; we also received a donation from Davis Construction to purchase our own Pitsco Structure Testing instrument to further the program within our school.

The TRAC program allows the students to compete, but having our own tester will put our STEAM program in a whole new level. For more details on the TRAC competition, please visit <https://www.michigan.gov/mdot>.

Unfortunately, this year's competition has been cancelled due to COVID-19. Our 8th grade students worked very hard at drafting their proposals to be accepted into the competition and we all really looked forward to the event.

We are continuing with the process as we have our own tester on order. It has been very gratifying watching these young minds explore different building designs, test their ideas in software programs, drafting them with CAD programs, and making their designs come to life by building their own prototypes to be tested. Participating in a multi-step project of this magnitude has offered our students authentic and real-life challenges that will carry with them throughout their education and into adulthood.

Improvements to St. Patrick Campus Continue

St. Patrick Campus improvements continue to progress. Last summer the Annex Building, also known as the old convent, was razed. More recently, the parish-owned house across Center Street from the gym was also demolished.

The school itself is also being upgraded. With funds from a large security grant, new exterior doors and a new security system have been installed. This system includes cameras strategically placed throughout the school hallways and at key exterior entries. New cameras and a new buzzer system to admit visitors replaced the old system that had been in place for more than ten years. Door locks are now controlled digitally.

In addition, safety lighting for the Grand River Avenue side of the school, the driveway between the church and school, and the parking lot between the church and school was installed at minimal cost to the school. Lighting fixtures were provided

at factory cost by Eaton/Cooper Lighting through Crites Tidey & Associates of Grand Rapids. Centennial Electric and NECA/IBEW Local 665 of Lansing provided labor at no cost, as a community outreach project.

Six lights were replaced with new LED lights which increased light output for better safety and security of our students and parishioners and also reduced our electrical usage by 66%. This project was the second phase of LED exterior lighting upgrades around our buildings; additional areas will be upgraded as funds and resources allow.

Finally, the school library is getting a facelift. A reorganization project, in its initial stage, involves creating new age-appropriate spaces, colorful signage, and child-friendly shelving. Volunteers and the art classes will be assisting, with no added cost to the school.

New Programs for Sacramental Preparation

There have been a few changes in the past year in the Children's Faith Formation ministry. Perhaps the most important change was in the way we prepare our students to receive the sacraments.

We began using new programs for students preparing to receive their First Communion and to be confirmed. The new programs allow the students from our Catholic and public schools to come together to learn about the sacraments.

Since parents are the primary teachers for their children, the parents of the second and eighth grade students were also educated on the sacraments by spending several weeks in formation with Carolyn Heckman. This allowed the parents to gain more knowledge about the sacraments their children would be receiving. This preparation will help guide them through the process and help them answer questions that their children might have.

The second-grade students are now using *Signs of Grace* from Sophia Institute, which teaches them about Reconciliation and the Eucharist separately. The students learned about Reconciliation in the fall and then received this sacrament from Father Mike. The students are currently learning about the Eucharist, and they will receive their First Communions in May.

St. Patrick teachers and catechists shared their time and talents with the students on Sunday evenings for an eight week session. The students had the best of both worlds, gathering as one body of the parish and gaining Catholic knowledge from dedicated Catholics. Forty one St. Patrick, Portland Public, and homeschooled students will receive the sacrament in May.

The eighth-grade students are now using *Chosen* from Ascension Press to learn about Confirmation. When the

students are finished with their eight-week session, they will be confirmed in May. The 46 students are a combination of St. Patrick, Portland Public, and homeschooled students.

Johnathan Johnson was gracious enough (or Father Mike twisted his arm enough) to give up his Sunday afternoons and evenings to share his knowledge with the students. Mr. John told them about his experience and theological education. I believe that both students and instructor have enjoyed this positive experience.

Because of these changes to our sacramental preparation programs, our St. Patrick teachers and Monday night catechists had more time to focus in depth on other aspects of our faith.

Another small change, but one that made a huge impact, was the collection of coins for Positive Solutions, Informed Choices (formerly Pregnancy Services of Ionia County---PSIC). In the past the students collected diapers and made blankets for the agency. This year we learned that their greatest need was monetary donations, so we kicked it up a notch and started the *Baby Bottle Coin Challenge*. This gave the students an incentive to challenge each other, and the class who donated the most each month was rewarded. There were three classes that ended up winning this reward, and altogether we collected \$513.51 during the three months it ran. The students still made blankets for the agency.

What else is going on around St. Patrick Parish? It has been a strange yet rewarding year!

We all know about Father Mike's goal to "get yourself into the pews" and "show your face at Mass." Along with his motivational homilies and making attendance at Mass a high priority, he has brought to the surface the serious matter of our Catholic faith. As a result, more people are attending Mass, getting married at St. Patrick Church, having their children

baptized, joining the church, receiving the sacraments, and becoming involved in the many groups that have become available.

Does it start with the children? The parents? The teachers and staff? Father Mike? Why not start with YOU?

More than 25 students went forward on November 7, when Father Mike asked how many of them have felt a call to the religious life.

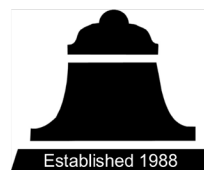

networking, and IT support. Every responsibility that he took on gave him more knowledge of the company.

In 2015, after several years of simultaneously handling safety, IT, and metering, Chris facilitated strategic planning and tactical planning for the staff.

In 2017 he wrote the business plan for a new endeavor for the company, the Fiber-to-Home Project, that would provide fiber optic internet to Homeworks' entire customer base. The information for this plan came from two feasibility studies that had been contracted out.

In October 2018, the \$73,000,000 fiber project was adopted unanimously and Chris was promoted to Fiber Outside Plant Manager. Chris points out proudly that in the past 18 months, Homeworks has built out more than 700 miles of fiber and is currently servicing 2800 homes.

So, whatever became of that LCC degree in Medical Anthropology? Chris, like many other young adults,

ended up switching course and spent several years going to night school at Davenport University. Along the way, he earned two associate degrees and finally in 2017 earned his bachelor degree in Business Management with a specialty in Leadership Effectiveness. We recall having dances in the building; square dancing was popular at that time. In 1951-1952, we finally moved into the brand new high school for our junior year.

Despite our early resentment of having to remain at St. Patrick's, I now have no regrets as we received an excellent education.

In later years, the nuns' home became Miss Laura's, a preschool for 3 to 5 year olds which met two or three times a week for 2 hours. It was operated by Laura Stegenga assisted by Miss Joan (Opperman). Upon Laura's retirement, it was taken over by the parish and managed by Carol Kahn.

Sorry for not remembering more. Other classmates might have additional memories. Many others who attended school in the nuns' house are no longer with us.

Ralph Wight (1979) has been around the world, but the museum he knows best is the one in his own home. 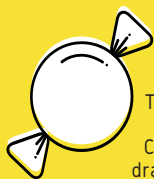

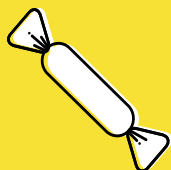

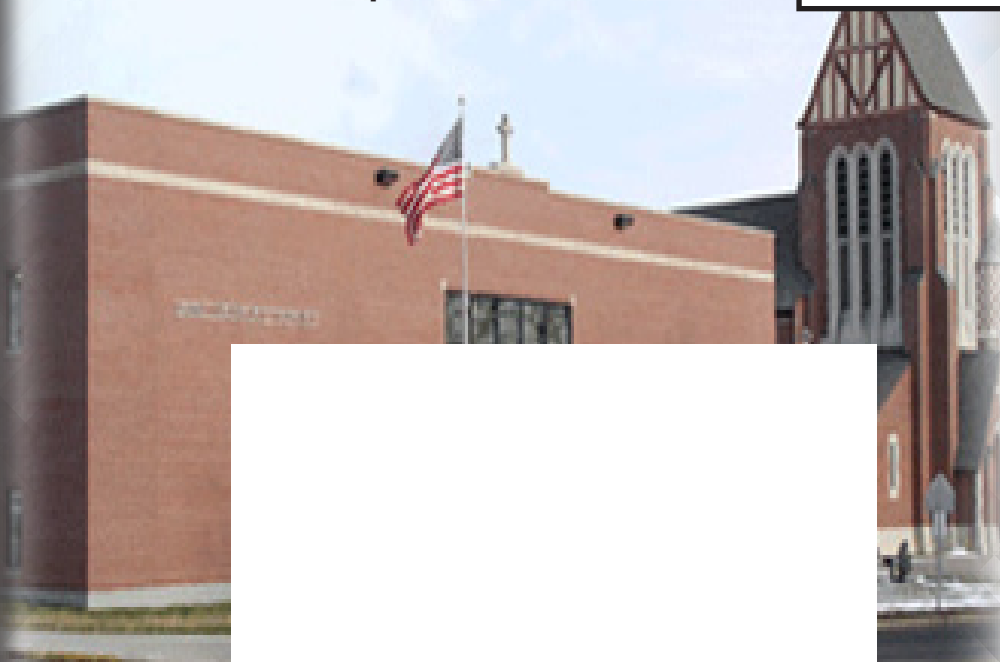
