COVID CAN'T KEEP US DOWN! Despite virus, St. Patrick Church and School continue to thrive

Who would have ever thought that 2020 would turn out to be such an unusual year? COVID-19 and the worldwide response to it have created a historic and newsworthy time that will certainly be remembered by all. People from Portland will remember the quiet streets, closed businesses, and eerie silence that blanketed the community for several weeks in March and April. St. Patrick parish has its own story that will, undoubtedly, be told by those who were there. The story about adaptations and survival.

The executive order from Governor Whitmer to shut down all schools came on Thursday, March 12, 2020. It definitely was a cause for concern, but thankfully, St. Patrick School was prepared.

"We anticipated the shutdown ahead of time," said High School Principal Randy Hodge. "We had a plan ready, which allowed us to adapt and transition to distance learning efficiently and effectively. Even though this was the first time we had to face an issue like this, we had the know-how and the tools that allowed us to successfully

switch to remote learning. Despite the challenges we faced, our students only missed one day of instruction. We did not panic; we were prepared!"

K-8 Principal Cortney Smith agreed, "St. Patrick was extremely nimble and able to shift seamlessly from in-person to remote instruction."

By Monday, March 17, the students from St. Pat's were "back in school," completing lessons and participating

in virtual classroom instruction with their teachers.

St. Patrick Church also faced unprecedented conditions. Working under the directives of the governor and Bishop Walkowiac, Sunday Masses were immediately suspended.

Administrative Assistant Amy Smith said that the Serenity Prayer was what got her through those first difficult days. The parish office was closed, there were no Sunday Masses, and though the questions kept coming, she didn't always have the answers.

Thankfully, the church itself remained open, with protocols in place, so that worried parishioners had a place to sit quietly and pray. Weekday Masses also continued.

Within a few weeks, St. Pat's was ready to begin Sunday Masses online. Each Sunday at 10:00 a.m., Father Mike Alber celebrated Mass in the church, with no one present except an altar server, a lector, the organist, and the camera man. The response was phenomenal. The

debut Mass on April 5 garnished 3500 views. Holy Week services also were seen by thousands of viewers.

When the weather warmed, an enormous white tent was erected in the parish parking lot, and St. Patrick parishioners could once again attend live Sunday Mass. Hundreds of people were there each week, wearing masks and carrying their own chairs.

Student **Spitlight**

Our Student Spotlight this issue is sophomore Joshua Snitgen, a third-generation Shamrock with a passion for science and technology.

"I've always been very curious about how things work," says Joshua. "I used to take apart old phones and electronics when I was little just to see what they looked like inside. Then I got really interested in astronomy and how the universe works. I was the kid that asked for things like telescopes and chemistry kits for Christmas."



This natural curiosity has allowed Joshua to work ahead in his science classes at St. Patrick High School.

"I was able to take freshman science as an eighth grader at St. Pats, then completed biology on my own in the summer through Michigan Virtual," says Joshua. He's currently the only sophomore studying physics with a class of seniors. "Mr. Hodge and my teachers have been so helpful and encouraging; I don't know if I could have done this at any other school!"

Joshua was also a co-leader of the St. Patrick School "Hack Club" for two years, where he helped other students explore computer coding and mini-robotics competitions at weekly after-school meetings.

"I remember talking with Mr. Austin at the St. Patrick Summer Fest the summer before seventh grade," says Joshua. "He told me about 'Hack Club,' an international network of student-led computer coders. I didn't know much about coding at the time, but it sounded so exciting that I couldn't stop thinking about how to get others involved!"

The recent COVID-19 shutdowns gave Joshua an opportunity to do a lot of science-related writing. His blog, thatspreposterous.com, delivers a weekly dose of "how can that possibly be true?" topics in astronomy, physics, and quantum mechanics. He's also been working on a science fiction novel that he hopes to finish before the end of the year.

"St. Patrick School has been a great place to try new things," says Joshua. "The teachers and staff have always encouraged me to explore my ideas."

Joshua is the son of Doug (1996) and Grace Snitgen. His sister Emily is a freshman at St. Patrick High School. Joshua is a member of the St. Patrick Bowling and Quiz Bowl teams. He also enjoys playing piano, studying business, planning escape rooms, and traveling with his family.

Like Father, Like Son!



St. Patrick High School principal and alumnus Randy Hodge (Class of 1987) is currently enrolled in the Diocese of Grand Rapids Diaconate Formation program. The diaconate program is a four-year discernment process to ascertain if the interested individual meets all the necessary and required qualifications to become a deacon.

Three years ago, while spending time before the Blessed Sacrament, Randy Hodge felt an unexpected calling from God. The voice was suggesting to him that he should pursue the diaconate.

Ironically, that same week, several people from the St. Patrick School family asked him if he had ever considered becoming a deacon. Taking that as a sign, Randy began researching the diaconate program in the Diocese of Grand Rapids and ended up meeting with Deacon Jim Hessler, who oversaw the program at that time, and soon began the application process.

Before a candidate can submit his application, he must meet the following qualifications. He must be:

• A Roman Catholic man, at least 35 years of age (and no older than his early 60s).

• An active member of his parish, living within the diocese.

• In good health, of sound moral character and mature faith, and a regular participant in the sacramental life of the Church.

• If married, in a strong,

valid, Catholic marriage for a minimum of five years and have the support of his wife and family.

• If unmarried, be willing and able to commit to celibacy.

The application and screening process are rigorous. Sixteen candidates are chosen for the program, which enrolls a new class every other year. Randy was accepted into the class of deacons called the Parmenas Class, which began its formation in 2019, and began his first year, which is called Aspirancy.

After the first year, if the Aspirant agrees to continue in the program and the diaconate assessment team believes he has met all the requirements to continue in the program, he then becomes a Candidate for the next three years.

Throughout the four years of the program, the Candidate will take a required 20 courses through the University of Notre Dame STEP program. Each course lasts approximately 6-8 weeks and is completed online. The candidate is expected to commit approximately 25-30 hours a month completing courses and meeting the other requirements of the program, which also includes time spent volunteering in prisons, hospitals, nursing homes, and parish and street ministry.

The diaconate is not a paid ministry; it is one of service. However, a deacon may be hired to fill the role of Director of Faith Formation or administrator of a parish, or work in some other paid position in a parish or diocese. In those instances, he is being paid because of the job he is hired to fulfill and not because of his role as deacon.

If a candidate finishes the program and is ordained to the permanent diaconate (not to be confused with the transitional diaconate for those who are becoming priests), the bishop assigns him to a parish. If Randy successfully completes the diaconate program and is ordained to the permanent diaconate, this would not impede his ability to continue in his role as administrator at St. Patrick School.

Randy has enjoyed taking the courses through the STEP program and enjoys learning more about the Catholic faith. He says that he has enjoyed the first year of the program. "Michelle and I have enjoyed spending time with the other Aspirants and their wives and look forward to the second year of the program," he said.

Athletic Association Needs Your Help

Successful Fall Festival Dinner and Raffle are Crucial

For nearly 70 years, St. Pat's Athletic Association has been a rock-solid fixture at St. Pat's, supporting the entire athletic program and helping out wherever we are needed. Though there have been a few times in past decades when our funds ran low, generous donations and careful budgeting allowed us to survive the tough times and get back on track.

Last year, the school and parish needed our support more than ever. Prior to the start of the 2019-20 school year, we discovered the gym floor needed replacing. The Athletic Association stepped forward and covered the entire cost. When we decided to rebuild the Fr. Flohe building in a way that allowed us to leverage the building for multi-use, year-round parish, school, and athletic needs, the Athletic Association again came through with the funding.

As a result of these two unexpected projects, we have depleted not only most of our savings account but our rainyday fund, as well. This is the challenge we faced back in January. We looked forward to our upcoming fundraisers and sports seasons that would allow us to begin the path back to stable finances. We had faced challenges in the past, but through the hard work of our volunteers and the generosity of our supporters, Shamrock athletics had never been in danger.

We have never faced a challenge like COVID-19. As a result of the coronavirus, events supporting the Athletic

Association like our Shamrock Auction and Fall Festival have been either cancelled or reduced in scale, making fundraising for St. Patrick sports nearly impossible. On top of this, the

MHSAA has rules in place to minimize or eliminate fans at high school sporting events for the foreseeable future. This limits opportunities to gather as a community and cuts into our revenues from ticket sales, concessions, and 50/50 raffles.

The spirit to raise the money is still alive and well, but the reality is that COVID-19 and the MHSAA rules will dictate what we can and cannot do. It is a much more stressful financial position than we've ever seen in the past, and we are asking for your help in finding a way out of it.

We can't hold our annual Fall Festival like we usually do, but we have redesigned it so that it complies with the rules that are in place. The only two events of Fall Festival that we can conduct this year are the takeout dinner and the redesigned raffle. It is crucial to the future of Shamrock athletics that these two events succeed and turn a profit.

Our Mission

It is obvious that the old convent, also known as the annex building, on Center Street, which was demolished last year, continues to evoke memories. Carol (Miller, 1965) Kahn sent a note to The Shamrock after reading the article in the last issue.

Carol remembers her own involvement in the transformation of the convent, after she purchased Miss Laura's Wee People in 1994. "I had big shoes to fill," she said. "In 1995 I moved the preschool from the East Grand River location to the annex building."

The name of the preschool was still Miss Laura's Wee People, even after Carol became the owner/program director, and it stayed the same until 2007 when St. Patrick purchased the furnishings and by mutual decision changed the name to St. Patrick Preschool.

The preschool was moved into the lower level of the school in 2014.

The history of the annex building includes many additional uses, including five years as a daycare center, the headquarters for the youth program, and an adult foster care center.

"Previous to 1995, it was O'Neill's Adult Foster Care Facility," said Carol. "The closing of that business gave us a place to put Miss Laura's Wee People.

"I still miss that old building, it contained so many wonderful memories and children's smiles."



Excerpts from Veronica's NET Journal


Getting Ready: Sometimes I sit here and I fear the future. I pray, "Dear God, I only have two weeks left!" And then my lovely sister Sophie tells me how many nights I have left in the house, and I cry over what I'm leaving behind. Don't get me wrong, I am SO excited, and I have no doubt this is where I'm supposed to be! But even so, there is so much that I don't know. There are very few things I do know. But what I do know far outweighs what I don't. God is good all the time. And all the time, God is good. God loves me. Jesus saves me. He picks me up when I fall. This experience will be like nothing I've ever done. I realize that, while life will be flipped upside-down, it will also be flipped right-side-up as God shows me what he wants.

Keep me in your prayers this week and next, and know you are in mine! Your prayers will be what gives me the graces to be everything God is calling me to be this year!

Week 1: I have been at the NET Center for five days now. Most people have been here for two, but I came early for music training. I have never seen an environment, a culture, like the one here. Everyone wants to be here, and everyone is here for the same reason: to grow in Christ and to be the missionaries we are all called to be. That means that I, the introvert, was literally running to meet new people and help them with their luggage yesterday. At one point I paused, and I was like, "Whaaaaat???" That is so totally not me, but having been immersed in this culture for three days, by that point, it allowed Christ to pull out the extroverted part of me to show me how I could start to serve others.

I did struggle at the beginning, leaving my family. Being the oldest of eight and the first one to go made it hard. But isn't the Holy Spirit called the Comforter? He is, and he does comfort us! The thing is, I am very much on "Jesus high" right now. I know that probably in a week or two when I start to struggle, I'm going to wish for home. I think a lot of us have that one thing we want when we are upset about something. I'll want home. So please pray for me over these next four weeks. On Sunday morning, we will all leave the NET center to go to Camp Wapogaset, otherwise known by the NETters here as Wapo. During this time they've asked us to leave our phones in our lockers at the NET center, so you won't hear from me for at least two weeks. I also learned that our fifth week of training will be on the road with our team supervisor. So here we go! Pray that the Holy Spirit can show me the hidden rooms of my heart. Pray to my guardian angel, that he will help me become aware of those rooms. Pray that Mary will wrap me in her mantle and keep me safe. Pray that St. Joseph will support me with his strong arms. He is, after all, a carpenter. They're pretty strong.
