Another Trip to the State Finals



Portland St. Patrick School has certainly had its share of athletic success, but over the past five years, the football team has found its niche. The Shamrocks traveled to the state finals in 2017, 2019, and 2020; and to the semifinals in 2018. This year was different from any football season in Michigan history. It was also the longest season in Michigan history. Because of the pandemic, the season was cancelled twice before finally being able to finish on January 16, 2021, almost five months after it began in August of 2020.

The beginning of the season was confusing, to say the least, as teams across the state were allowed to practice and condition but then had their season cancelled. The young men were left confused, not knowing if they would be able to play the sport that they love. In early September, a reduced schedule was announced and

the games commenced, albeit without the normal crowds. Each player/staff member was allowed just two fan tickets.

The boys worked hard to get back into shape and took the field on September 19 against Webberville. Despite being rusty, the Shamrocks won handily, winning 40-18. Over the next weeks, the Shamrocks defeated every team, outscoring their opponents 252-111. They gained much respect and team confidence when they held off Merrill, a team who had just come



from 11-man football and was heavily favored.

In the playoffs, an expanded field led to blowout wins over their first two opponents, North Adams-Jerome, 52-0, and Waldron, 53-26. Colon was next on the schedule. Colon had won the State Championship in the upper division in 2019, and was the largest school in the lower division. Colon was also heavily favored to beat the Shamrocks. Coming in with a bigger team, in numbers as well as size, the Colon offense featured a 260-pound fullback and a highly rated offense that was very difficult to stop. The Shamrocks were ready to play, and in what was one of the most gritty and outstanding victories in St. Patrick School history, the Shamrocks came from behind and defeated Colon 44-34.

When we contacted Stan Fedewa about doing a Spotlight article on him, his reply was, "Why me? There's nothing special about me." But, Stan gave it some thought and changed his mind. He said, "I was quickly reminded that yes, there is. I'm the 11th child of 14, born to Marvin and Janet Fedewa. But, even more importantly, I am a son of the King of Kings. I am lucky to be married for over 34 years to my best friend and blessed to have an amazing son and daughter." In his own words, here is his story.

I was born in 1963 on a very important day, my birthday. It also happened to be the very first day of school for my twin sisters. My mom was in labor and rushed each little girl into a classroom. Then off to the hospital she went. Unfortunately for my sisters, she didn't read the class lists, so Judy and Jane were in the wrong rooms. They spent the entire first day not answering because teachers were calling them by the wrong names. The next day, teachers figured it out when the girls came in and said they had a new baby brother, me.

My parents had a dairy farm on Emery Road, south of town, and a cottage on Morrison Lake. My siblings can attest that I was a little accident prone. Mom had to take me to the emergency room more than a couple times for stitches and X-rays. My bumps and bruises always seemed to be a little more than a bandaid and kiss could handle. The X-Rays fascinated me. I thought seeing inside the body without having to

get cut open was cool. This is what started me thinking about a career as an X-ray technologist.

Being number 11 means a lot of things. It means I have four older brothers and six older sisters to tease me, boss me, and teach me the ways of the world. It means I have one younger brother and two younger sisters whom I get to tease, boss, and teach the ways of the world. Most of all, it means I am part of a family that works together, plays together, and prays together. We did all of these things each

and every day. We worked hard, played harder, and said all our prayers together.

I attended St Patrick School for 12 years and graduated in 1981. I have many fond memories of those years. Some I will happily share here, and some are best saved for class reunions! Two things my children did not learn in school that were required way back when: cursive in 3rd grade (a lost art) and square dancing with Sister Kathleen in 6th grade. This actually came in handy later in life when I had to teach my bride how to square dance at our wedding while

my cousin's band, The Royal Ramblers, played and their sister Jan called the dance. Who would have thought this would be a useful life skill?

High school then, like high school today, still feels like the fastest and also the longest four years in a child's life. For me it brought an undefeated IV football season my freshman year and the varsity girls basketball team reaching the state finals for the first time ever my sophomore

year. I lost the tip of my finger in a paper cutter incident while we were making confetti for the semifinals game. (That was a bloody mess and another trip to the ER.) Some of you may have to Google what an old paper cutter is to understand how this could have happened.

Between my junior and senior years, I had severe cataracts in both eyes. By the time I had both surgeries, I was only able to distinguish shades of gray. While in the

Newest Shamrock Team: Trap Shooting

On March 1, 2020, St. Patrick School launched their first 6th- to 12th- grade trap shooting team. The team is registered as a member of the Michigan State High School Clay Target League. The team is led by head coach, Mr. Craig Corbeil. Assistant coaches are Troy Smith and Ben and Mandy Teachworth.

The team competes locally at Oakhill Gun Club, Pewamo, MI. The trap team will compete during fall and spring seasons for both girls and boys.

The State Tournament occurs in June, and every league participant is invited to attend. Participants compete against student athletes in classifications based on similar shooting abilities determined by their season average score. All members of the team are required to complete hunter's safety training. Students are eligible to receive varsity letters and college scholarships.

New Music Director at St. Patrick Church

James Tavadze is the new music director at St. Patrick Parish. He is originally from the country of Georgia, located at the intersection of Eastern Europe and Western Asia. James has two grown sons, Bakar and Ilia, from his first marriage, and an 11-year-old daughter, Liza, with his wife, Elene. James tells us about his journey to the United States and to our parish.

I started playing music when I was seven. My parents bought an upright piano for me. It was black, huge and and it served for more than 15 years. I entered the Special Music School of Tbilisi, Georgia, when I was 10. It was one of the few schools in the former Soviet



Union where music was taught on a professional level, as if it already was a conservatory.

As a child I played both solo and orchestral recitals. But my greatest passion was improvisation. After finishing the music school, I became a student at Tbilisi State Conservatory, from which I graduated with Master's degrees in Piano Performance and Composition. During a long period of time after that, I collaborated with drama theatres in my country as a composer writing music for theatrical performances. At the same time, I played for art exhibitions improvising on piano according to the character of exposed pieces of art.

In 2015, a friend of mine who lived in the U.S. told me he wanted to open a music school in Connecticut and asked if I would be willing to take the professional part of the business. My wife, Elene, and I decided I should accept the offer. We decided so because of the poor economic situation in our home country. We already had Liza, and we knew we should do something to take care of her future.

I traveled to the U.S. in October 2015, and this is when

my American journey began. However, things did not go as planned regarding the music school. My friend was not sure if he wanted to get a loan and take all the risks related to the business. I was faced with a very difficult choice: should I stay in the U.S. or go back to Georgia? I started looking for doctoral programs in piano throughout the country.

My childhood friend, an excellent pianist named Vakhtang Kodanashvili, who by this time lived in Indiana, became aware of my situation. He called me and told me I could visit him, and he could introduce me to Professor Moriarty, Chair of Piano Performance at MSU, who was his professor when he was a doctoral student. I traveled to Indiana to visit Vakhtang and his family, and then Vakhtang gave me a ride to Michigan to meet with my future professor. Professor Moriarty warmly welcomed me into the College of Music and accepted me into her studio as a doctoral student.

In 2016, I came to Michigan with my family to start my doctoral studies and a new life. We had some funds available for the first period of our American life, but I needed a job to be able to continue. I started looking for church job openings. I saw there was one in Portland, at St. Patrick Roman Catholic Church. The church was about 30 minutes from our home, but I really needed a job and decided to try. (My cousin, Temo, and his wife, Debra, presented us with a car, an Oldsmobile which was old but in a very good shape.) I sent an email to the church address mentioned on the website and I got a response. Sometime after that, I was driving to Portland for my interview. When I saw St. Patrick Church my very first feeling was - Home. There were three people waiting for me: Therese, Deacon Don, and Rose Marie.

I come from a Greek Orthodox background. As a child and teenager, I lived in what was then considered the Soviet Union. At that time, the people of the country, especially of my home country, Georgia, were gradually becoming anti-Soviet. Going to church was especially meaningful by then because of all the oppression and terror the Church and the Soviet people suffered at the hands of the Communist party. While there was no real oppression when I was a child, a dark shadow of former decades was still present in mind of the people.

As time passed, not all of those who went to church during that last Soviet period kept going to church later. This fact revealed that some people were going to church just because doing so was anti-Soviet and "fashionable." But many remained faithful!

I had periods of getting closer to church and periods of immersing in a modern, secular lifestyle, until I finally realized it was the Church where I belonged with all my

hospital I got even more interested in a career in the medical field. The time spent with limited eyesight helped me become more compassionate and an empathetic listener.

My senior year, the girls softball team won the state championship---I did not make confetti for that game! Academically I enjoyed math and science. I was not very good at either one, but I did enjoy those classes.

I went to Lansing Community College and graduated as a Radiologic Technologist. During my final term, the Director of Clinical Services for the MSU Department of Radiology came to talk to us about a brand new diagnostic technology called Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI). At the time MSU had the only one in the state. and most people had never heard of it. I approached her after class and expressed my interest in it. Later she called me and asked if I wanted to do a three-month internship. If it worked out there would be a full time job waiting for me.

That was over 34 years ago. and I am still a Spartan today.

Being in MRI at MSU from the very beginning has given me great opportunities. I have been able to meet many Spartan athletes. as well as Olympic and professional athletes. I have also met local and national government officials, religious leaders, and celebrities. While continuing to work running the MRI scanner, I also spent several years as a college anatomy instructor and co-authored a textbook for MRI Technologists. I have written several questions for the National Board Exams for Radiologic Technologists. Even though I have been there a few years, I still enjoy going to work every day and helping people with their medical problems. I have also been back to St Patrick School a few times and have spoken at Career Days which was a fun experience.

I met my wife, Nancy, while we were both kids working at McDonald's in Portland. We have been married for over 34 years. My excitement for health care and her caring nature led her into health care as well. She has been a registered nurse for over 27 years. With both of us in these roles, we have been able to support each other professionally and spiritually.

My parents never stopped teaching by example. Nancy still says how she learned so much about how to be a Christian, a wife, and a mother from watching my mom. She had many heart-to-hearts with my dad. She says these gave her so much insight into the Catholic faith and helped her on her journey to join the Catholic Church. I think the love my wife had for my parents is something special and the way they loved her was pretty special too. It's because of this relationship our marriage has had a strong foundation and grown so well and solid all these years.

Like the family I grew up in, we work, play, and pray together. We enjoy woodworking, house remodeling, and gardening (work). We have done a lot of traveling around the USA and Caribbean (play). We are members of St Mary in Williamston where we have both been on a variety of councils and committees, volunteering our time, talents, and treasures where God leads us (pray). Presently I am an officer in our local Knights of Columbus council and an officer in the 4th Degree Assembly.

Our son, Nathan, recently moved from Colorado to Illinois. This decreased the drive from 20 hours to five, so we look forward to being able to see him more frequently. He is an

1999 Grad Pioneers **New Health Care Program**

In the mid-February issue of HealthBeat, a newsletter provided by Spectrum Health, a new program was publicized. The program collaborationbetweenMel Trotter and several major health care providers in the West Michigan area; it removes barriers to medical care for those



who are lost to the medical community.

St. Patrick alumna Beth Makowski, DO (1999), who is a section chief with the Spectrum Health Medical Group hospitalist team, was instrumental in establishing the program. Beth volunteers at the newly-formed Community Partners Medical Clinic in partnership with medical students from Michigan State University's College of Human Medicine, where she teaches internal medicine. "The goal is to remove barriers to medical care for those who are lost to the medical community," said Beth. "We try to reengage and redevelop relationships to help folks get the care that they need. We see patients there in the clinic, but then we

also, for some patients, try to establish them with a primary care physician out in the community."

Beth graduated from MSU in 2003 with a BA in physiology, and from the MSU College of Osteopathic Medicine in 2007. She completed her residency at Metro Hospital in Grand Rapids in 2010 and completed a 3-year fellowship in cardiology at University of Michigan in 2012.

In addition to her volunteer work at the clinic, Beth also volunteers with Doctors Without Borders, a group of physicians who travel abroad to treat disadvantaged patients. She is also spearheading an effort to take medical care to the streets so that the homeless can receive services.

Beth and her husband Bill live in Ada. They have a son, Jack.

Update: Net Ministries Veronica White

Veronica White (2020) is serving on an evangelization team with NET Ministries. These are excerpts from a letter she sent in February.

Last semester, my team reached young people in the states of Minnesota, Wisconsin, North Dakota, and Michigan. This semester is a completely different story! We are now a partly virtual retreat team, one of four. We started with training in Minnesota in January, and from there we traveled to Colorado, where we did a few inperson retreats. Our final destination (where we are now) was a retreat center in Wrightwood, CA, which is up in the mountains.

We've been here at this retreat center for more than a week now, doing virtual retreats! To be honest, I didn't really expect to enjoy them much, because I'd much rather be in person, but I have fallen in love with this ministry. I also had a pride check, realizing that I was limiting God to in-person ministry, when in reality God has no limits

Through virtual retreats, we are able to reach young people in places that are shut down, places that we can't reach with in-person ministry. Some of these youth are still shut in their homes, unable to do much of anything, and their relationship with God is struggling because of that. They think that God has abandoned them.

Many of these young people have lost hope. But that's where we come in. We show them our joy; show them that it's okay not to be perfect; show them that they can pray anywhere, even in their bedrooms. We show them that God has no limits. One of my favorite parts is when I get to see one youth change throughout the retreat. Often at the beginning they are withdrawn, quiet, or paying no attention. But as time goes on we grab their attention and get to witness a change in them!

Memories of a Country School Teacher at St. Patrick's



In the 1960s St. Patrick's welcomed an unusual new first grade teacher who would begin working with the Sisters of St. Joseph. She and many of the Sisters became close friends delivering a high-quality student-centered and Even today, her former students speak of Vera (Lawless) Hartwig with gratitude, respect, and clarity of memory that


suggest she was very special in their early lives.

Vera was educated by leaving her Peck Lake Road family home and living with a family relative to attend a teacher college called Ionia County Normal. It prepared young, mostly women to become professional educators. She later received her B.A. from Western Michigan University.

In March of 1962, with two young children at home, Vera lost her husband, suddenly and unexpectedly. Life changed. She completed the school year and returned the following fall to continue her classroom duties. She always said that what made that possible was the remarkable love, support, and physical help from the good Sisters of St. Joseph, including the principal. Sister Marlene was especially helpful. She would get Vera's room ready in

the mornings and assist her with many tasks---during the days and even in the evenings. In return, Vera would keep Sister Marlene the other Sisters supplied with fresh apple pies. A loving exchange.

To make ends meet, Vera worked summers with the Ionia Intermediate Schools helping children with special learning issues. She quietly, without compensation, also helped some of her St. Pat's students with learning issues, evenings and on Saturdays.



Pat and Carolyn Heckman were thrilled to be expecting a baby. Their hearts filled with love, hope and dreams for their child. Then came the devastating news that their unborn son had passed away. Jacob Daniel Heckman was born on January 17, 2019, at 19 weeks gestation. The loss was devastating, but faith and the support of friends and family helped Pat and Carolyn find meaning in Jacob's brief life.

"When miscarriages and stillbirths happen, hospitals provide good medical information," said Carolyn. they are woefully unprepared to provide help beyond that. Thankfully, a good friend of ours, who is in the funeral industry, told us that we did not have to turn our baby over to the hospital, but that we could name him, have a funeral service for him, and bury him."

Carolyn said that having that knowledge and the control of what would happen to their son brought them great comfort and helped them immensely in the healing process. Shortly after Jacob's funeral the Heckmans realized that most families who had experienced similar losses were never given that kind of information or any choice at all. Pat and Carolyn began working on a plan to change that for local families.

Jacob's Ladder Foundation was formed in the fall of 2019 to provide practical help to families in our community who are impacted by miscarriage, stillbirth, or infant loss.

"Losing your baby is one of the most difficult experiences a family will ever suffer," said Carolyn. "During this time of shock and sadness, it can be difficult for you to know how to move forward. It is normal to grieve for your child, even if your child has died early in the womb. You may want to bury your child. You might just need to talk with someone who has lost a baby, who will walk with you through this process."

That is what Jacob's Ladder will do:

• Prepare you to know what to expect, from a parent's point

of view.

- Listen to your story. Your baby's life has meaning and
- Provide a coffin and burial place, at no cost, in Portland City Cemetery for your child. Your child will rest in an individual niche alongside other babies within a columbarium reserved for this purpose. Cremated remains may also be interred.
- Memorialize your baby with a name plaque, even if you have no remains to bury or your loss was long ago.

The 7000-pound marble columbarium arrived on January 15, 2021, two days before Jacob Heckman's second birthday. It was set on a concrete foundation east of section H1 of the Portland City Cemetery.

If you get a chance, stop by the Portland City Cemetery and see the columbarium. Imagine the local familes who will benefit from it.

If you lost a baby and would like to have him/her remembered, contact Carolyn Heckman at 734-368-6446. The back of the columbarium is blank, and will be used to engrave the names of those little ones, no matter how long ago they died.

If you would like to contribute to this effort, donations can be mailed to Jacob's Ladder Foundation, 5455 Goodwin Road, Lyons, MI 48851. Jacob's Ladder Foundation is a non-profit charitable organization (501c3). Fundraising efforts had to be suspended because of Covid 19, but will be ongoing so that all of the costs described above can be covered.



The columbarium is located in Portland City Cemetery east of section H1. It is designed to hold the remains of more than 275 babies. A huge thank you goes out to Bob and Casey Lenneman who donated time and materials to pour the concrete foundation upon which the columbarium sets
