Each September since 2003, the Father Flohe Foundation has hosted a wonderful celebration for the St. Pat's graduating classes who are celebrating their 50-year class reunion. This year however, COVID 19 created a need to change the plans for the *Class of 1970* which saw the date for their 50-year reunion change on two occasions. At last, on Saturday, May 15, the third time was the charm, and the *Class of 1970* was able to gather for their 50-year reunion.

Classmates met at the school at 2:30 p.m. Principal Randy Hodge showed them around the school and talked about what has changed and what has stayed the same since they graduated. Mr. Hodge said, "These tours are the highlight of these annual reunions for me; I get to hear stories from guests about

their school years and they often enlighten me about the history of the school. Many of the grads had not been in the school since they graduated and were surprised by how much things had changed. "

Though each classroom brought back memories from their high school years, the room that elicited the most talk and laughter was the science lab, which was the site of an unfortunate accident back in 1970 when three male members of the class attempted an unauthorized science experiment. 1981 Softball Team Brought Home First Shamrock State Championship!

The following article is reprinted with permission, from the Reunion of Champs *book, published in 2007.*

They had a lot of talent, a few lucky breaks, and a coach who believed in them to the depths of his heart. Combined, that was enough for a historic win, the first ever State Championship trophy for Portland St. Patrick School.

Coach Dick Willemin's Lady Shamrocks finished regular season play with a 20-2 record. It was the third consecutive year that St. Pat's won the league title. By the time the tournaments began, people from all over mid-Michigan were paying attention to the team and wondering, if this year, they had what it would take to go all the way.

Though the district games were lackluster by comparison, with weak competition, the rest of the tournament was high school softball at its best. The semifinal game against Pontiac Central was played at Bogue Flats in Portland before an estimated of crowd of 1,000. The opposing coach remarked that she'd never seen so many people at a girl's softball game.

PontiacCentral's pitcher, Vicky Morrow, was considered to be one of the best in the state. The next year she would take her team to the Class C Championship and then move on to star as a pitcher at U of M. She truly was brilliant that day, but Shamrock pitcher, Jane Rogers, was just as strong. Jane had already shut down the opposing team's offense, and the Shamrock hitters had broken through with some hits, when in the eighth inning, a coaching error resulted in Miss Morrow being taken off the mound.

It was a bizarre turn of events, and the Shamrocks capitalized on it, winning the game by a final score of 3-2.

The following week the Shamrocks traveled to Ranney

Park in Lansing for the Class D State Final game against Wyoming Lee. The game was scheduled for Saturday, but because of rain, had to be delayed until Monday.

The Shamrocks went to the park that day feeling confident and ready to play like champs. Once again, Jane was pitching great, and in front of a devoted and enthusiastic horde of supporters, the Lady Shamrocks played a nearly flawless game. They won 3-2 to take the 1981 crown.

"Jane really rose up for those last games," said an obviously elated coach. "She may not have thrown as hard as some of the pitchers we faced, but she did something that only four

pitchers in the entire state do each year. She won the last game."

"And all of the girls played errorless ball," he continued. "They looked like the State Champs they are."

SAINT PATRICK CHURCH RESTORATION

In 1926 construction of Saint Patrick Church began with a budget of \$80,000. That would be worth about \$1.2 to \$1.4 million in today's dollars. The dedication ceremony was held on June 27, 1927.

As we approach the centennial celebration of our church, it is showing its age and is in need of important restoration. During the past few months, Saint Patrick Parish has received sizable donations in excess of \$100,000 to be used towards restoring Saint Patrick Church.

Extensive improvements and repairs have already been completed using existing budget funds. Notably the tabernacle and the wood altar from the original Saint Patrick Church were returned to the sanctuary. Parishioner Tom Dailey, of Purus Masonry Restoration, has completed repairs to the foundation which includes patching the crumbling base blocks especially noticeable along Grand River Avenue and the south and east entrances. The cost of these repairs was below industry standards and additional repairs be-

yond the scope of the contract were also completed at no extra cost.

Plans are being developed by a subcommittee to the Plants and Grounds committee to provide advice on the first phase of the much needed restoration, which will focus on the sanctuary. Initial plans are to expand the sanctuary to its original configuration by moving the tabernacle against the back wall along with the arch and original crucifix and replacing the marble altar with an altar that better reflects the architecture of the church. The existing altar will be repurposed as a base for the restored statuary.

The carpeting will be removed to reveal the original decorative terrazzo floor in the sanctuary. St. Gerard parishioner, John Jared, of Concrete Resource has already agreed to restore

the terrazzo for the cost of labor alone. He has offered to donate the use of his equipment and the diamond pads used to polish the floor.

Preliminary plans also include the construction of accessible confessionals. These will be located where the choir and musicians currently lead us in song. The choir and musicians will be moved into the chapel along with the piano and the organ which will be renovated to meet today's standards. Other restoration projects include improved lighting in the sanctuary and repairs to the masonry on the cast concrete arches that frame the sanctuary.

As funds become available, additional restorations and improvements will be made. Initial plans are to install energy efficient windows to pro-

tect all the beautiful stained glass windows, improve lighting in the nave and add new chandeliers, restore the pews and install new kneelers, restore the terrazzo floor in the aisles, complete masonry work on the exterior and interior of the church, install insulation in the balcony ceiling, repair or replace the entrance doors, provide changing space and additional storage in the sacristy, and when needed replace the aging roof shingles.

Hopefully, with your prayers and stewardship, all this work can be accomplished prior to the centennial celebration of Saint Patrick Church in 2027.



IMPROVEMENTS AND REPAIRS COMPLETED TO DATE

During the past two years, some improvements and necessary repairs to Saint Patrick Church have been accomplished using existing budget funds and donations. Additionally, some devotional and liturgical items have been purchased to enhance the liturgy of Mass.

• The original tabernacle was restored and returned to the sanctuary and placed upon the original wood altar from the first Saint Patrick Church.

• An arch was added behind the new altar to better reflect the gothic architecture of the church.

 The statues of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, Blessed Virgin, St. Joseph, and St. Patrick were restored, as was the original crucifix.

• New candle stands, processional cross, sanctuary candle stand, and paschal candle stand were purchased.

• A new baptismal font was purchased and the font was placed in the narthex of the church, its original setting. The new font is better suited for current needs. The original baptismal font was damaged beyond repair and was put into storage.

• The granite baptismal font was removed and will be repurposed for later use.

• A handrail was installed to aid people entering and exiting the sanctuary.

• Roof valleys on the church were repaired to prevent further leaking and damage to the structure of the building. These roof repairs were completed last year.

• New energy efficient windows were installed in the chapel to protect the stained glass, to enhance their colors, and to keep the elements out.

• New energy efficient windows were installed in the sacristy to replace the windows that were outdated for their purpose. The glass from the old windows has been stored for future use.

• New cement work was done on the sidewalk, stairs, and pad on the east sacristy entrance.

• A new accessible entrance door was installed on the west side of church to replace the existing door due to corrosion of the aluminum.

• Work is currently being done to restore the crumbling foundation of the church.


