Classmates spent an incredible evening mingling and reminiscing. One class member said, "Fifty years and a pandemic make you appreciate the times you can still share with people

who have touched your life!"

Some of the memories shared by the group are a reminder that schools in the 1970's were a bit different than they are today!

One man remembered that Father Malewitz was their religion teacher and he sat on the desk in the front of the class and chain-smoked the entire hour.

Another memory was their junior year when the baseball team went to the state finals. It was the first year for the MHSAA to sponsor a baseball tournament, and it drew a huge crowd. Spectators were allowed to bring their own beer into the stadium.

Al Schrauben was the pitcher and the Shamrocks lost to Mount Pleasant Sacred Heart.

Other memories included their senior trip on a train, no girls sports except cheerleading, tomfoolery that included hanging a classmate by his beltloops in the coat closet, and the delicious sloppy joes that were served weekly in the cafeteria.

The Father Flohe Foundation was founded in 1988. Its primary function is to keep Catholic education available to the people of St. Patrick Parish and surrounding communities by funding some of the school expenses.

Kathy (Schrauben) Hermelyn (1975)

My career as a flight attendant with United Airlines started in January, 1979, at the age of 21. I became interested in this occupation when our high school typing teacher, Mrs. Jenkins, gave us an assignment to research a topic and write about it. I decided to do my report on the career of a Flight Attendant. Reporting on this made

me realize that I wanted to pursue this for my own career.

I had never flown before, so didn't even know if I would like to fly. But, at the age of 18, I finally took my first flight which was to Florida. My sister Ann and I flew down to visit good friends of our parents, Jim and Pauline Nowak. On that first flight I remember turning to Ann and telling her that this is what I wanted to do! I would have to be patient and wait three more years, since the minimum age was 21.

I worked for an insurance company, then for the State of Michigan, and I was finally 21 and able to apply to many different airlines.

United interviewed and accepted me into their 5 1/2 week training program in Chicago. Upon graduation from there, I was based and flew out of Chicago O'Hare for my first year. I transferred to Los Angeles in May of 1980 and lived in Marina del Rey, CA. I was furloughed in September of 1981, when then President Ronald Reagan, fired the striking air traffic controllers. I found a job working for a real estate investment company, where I worked until April of 1983. I received my recall notice from United and was recalled to Denver. I flew out of Denver for the next three years and

then finally got my transfer back to Los Angeles.

I met my husband, Edmund, during my layoff. He was raised in Santa Monica, CA. His family moved there from British Guyana, when he was 11 years old. We married in 1984 and have two sons, Mark and Ryan. We moved to Portland in 1989 to raise our boys.

> My career and flying have changed quite a bit since 1979! The biggest change and most memorable moment for me would have to be Tuesday, Sept. 11, 2001. I was working a flight from London to Chicago on that day, and we were about 1 1/2hrs. from landing in Chicago. Our captain had gotten a message that there had been an airplane that hit the World Trade Center but we didn't have any other details. They wanted the airplanes that were in the air to land immediately. We were sent to land in Toronto, Canada.

We landed and waited on the tarmac

for more information, not knowing how long we would be there. I had my flip phone and called my husband, Edmund, to let him know that I would be home later than I had thought. That is when I found out the unbelievable had taken place. Four airplanes had been taken down by terrorists and used as weapons to kill thousands of people. It didn't take long to overload the cell phone service. So calls were becoming difficult. We sat out in the holding area of the airport for a few hours and finally got a gate and

- Anna aids in building rapport, trust, and relationships with students and staff.
- Anna models positive behavior and how to interact in a positive way.
 - Anna gives confidence to those publicly speaking.
 - Anna is an all-around morale booster.

- Anna participates in reading interventions and other areas of academic support.
- Anna plays sensory games with those who have a sensory diet or occupational services.
 - Anna calms students during meltdowns.



April Climbs Mountains to Inspire Others

April is the daughter of St. Pat's grad, Luke Pung (1995). They live in Southend, England, 45 miles east of London. The following article was printed in the Southend Echo, June 7, 2022, and is reprinted with permission.)



An inspirational teenager with Down Syndrome who was told she might never walk has climbed the highest peaks in every country in the British Isles.

April Pung from Southend, has conquered Snowdon, Ben Nevis, Scarfell Pike, Carrauntoohil, and Slieve Donard along with her family in a bid to inspire others.

The 14-year old was diagnosed with Down Syndrome at birth, and within 12 hours her parents were told about a life-threatening heart defect. April was in heart failure from birth and was incredibly frail for the first year of her life, including being told it was unlikely she would ever walk unaided.

But April has defied expert opinion, and alongside mum Kate Williams, 38, and brother Draigen Pung, 12, has climbed the highest peaks in England, Ireland, Scotland, Wales, and Northern Ireland.

Mum Kate said, "We didn't know anything about her condition until she was born, but we always wanted just two things for her, which were to be able to build relationships with others and to have freedom.

"She struggles very much still with hyper-mobility which means on rocky terrain, she struggled to hold her balance.

"I had to offer her support up some of the mountains, but she is the one who has taken every step.

"April has a really strong personality and is very deter-

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Camp Covenant Hills

For five years in the mid-1990's, the sixth-grade students from St. Pat's attended Camp Covenant Hills in Otisville, MI, a twohour drive from Port-Teachers Pam land. Nickelson and Carol Janiczek wanted to give their students an experience that would help them develop leadership and problem-solving skills.

Students and chaperones went for three days, usually leaving on Wednesday and returning home on

Friday evening. The camp provided food, lodging, and staff to run various activities. Students stayed in cabins with bunk beds; there were two chaperones for each cabin.

Each day began with devotions in the chapel, which included prayers, scripture readings, and a few songs

before everyone headed to breakfast where they also received their schedules for the day.

The team-building activities were entertaining for the teachers and chaperones to observe. They watched as the camp staff gave the students tasks and the conditions to make the tasks successful. For example, the students would be on one side of an imaginary river, with tape on the floor showing the shores. They would have to get their entire team across the river, while abiding by the rules of the game. Pam Nickelson remembers, "They could use magic boots, but the same person could only wear them once. And they could only have so many trips across before the boots wouldn't work anymore."

The students came up with many additional ways of crossing that river! They carried each other across; they swung on a rope; they made human bridges, and in the course of the event, they discovered team-building skills that they didn't know they had.

Pam said, "Another task was to

navigate a wire course that wound through several trees, getting everyone on the team to the other side in a certain time. There was also one where the kids stood on a tarp and they had to turn the tarp completely over while the whole group was standing on it, without anyone stepping off."

Additional activities included candle making,

arts and crafts, and many others. The students would get to keep whatever they made. One camp staff member instructed them about birds and then took them on a hike to see how many birds they could see and identify. There was also canoeing and beach volleyball.

At night, there were presentations

in the cafeteria. One man brought in string loops and taught the kids how to make different shapes with them. Another brought in birds of prey and taught the kids all about them and told them how they were rehabilitated. There was even a square dance.

Probably the most memorable event was the high-confidence course, a series of ropes and logs and wires that the kids would navigate above the ground. The staff made sure that each student was properly harnessed and equipped with helmets. Noth-

ing was left to chance. About 10 feet off the ground, the kids would make their way around this course being instructed by the camp staff. Many students were apprehensive, but the staff coaxed them through each step. At the end, the students would ride a zip line back to the ground where the teachers would be waiting and the whole team would cheer for the students. It was very cool to see a normally shy child achieve this.

Pam says, "I remember marveling how the students really used leadership skills. You could see them working out ideas and presenting them to the rest of the group. Nothing was criticized. Most of the ideas were tried. We

> did the camp trip for about five years. And each time, it was a wonderful experience. It was safe. It was fun. It was educational. The students and teachers and chaperones all had good bonding experiences. When we got back to school, many of them had made new friends.

"My memory is not remember if we did fund

raising to come up with the fees or if the parents just paid. I remember my own satisfaction the year that I tried the high ropes course."

The return trip home was always pretty quiet, as the students were exhausted. But they came back knowing how to work together, knowing how to problem solve, and with a new respect for one another.

St. Patrick Church Restoration **UPDATE**

The Church Restoration Project continues. This project aims to address many issues that have arisen due to the age of the building and to restore it to its historic beauty. As we approach the centennial celebration of our church in 2026, repairs continue to be made as the funds become available. The parish has received several large donations and bequests that have funded these efforts. Ken Schneider is a member of the Building and Grounds Committee, and he has provided the photos and information for this article. Thank you to all who have donated to this effort. Stained Glass Windows





As reported in the spring issue of the Shamrock, protective glass panels will be installed on the remaining stained glass windows to match the panels previously installed over the stained glass in the chapel. During a recent rainstorm, water was discovered to be leaking through the windows above the baptismal font in the vestibule. Water has also leaked thru the windows in the balcony during wind-driven rain. The protective glass panels will help seal the windows to increase energy efficiency as well as enhance the light through the beautiful stained glass.

Exterior Doors

Repairs have been made to help stabilize the exterior doors of the church, especially the doors leading into the vestibule from Church Street. The door jamb is likely to be damaged beyond repair so new doors are being considered to replace the 100 year old doors. Weather stripping has been installed to increase energy efficiency.





Roof and Turret



The roof of the church shows evidence of hail damage. The aluminum flashing is also

The church roof, installed in the 1990's, has been inspected and there is evidence of damage from the May 10 hail storm that damaged numerous roofs in the area. Additional damage could have been caused by the 2015 tornado. If you look at the eave on the steeple above the Grand River Avenue entrance, you can see loose aluminum flashing. There is also evidence of long term leakage around the chimney with water stained interior wood and occasional pieces of loose mortar found on the sanctuary floor. Additional evidence of water infiltration problems can be seen in the turret leading up to the balcony. There are large areas of the spiral stairwell walls that have a white chalky substance called effervescence, a slow chemical process caused as rain water reacts with salts in the mortar leaving behind the white substance as the interior surface dries. Some interior bricks are spalling, which means that the bricks are flaking and crumbling. The mortar joints have also deteriorated in areas and will need to be removed and replaced in a process called tuck pointing.



Effervescence can be seen on the bricks inside the turret which houses the spiral staircase that leads to the balcony. This indicates long-term water infiltration.

Other Planned Restoration

Progressive AE, the company that designed the school bathroom remodel, will be contracted to help design the church restoration. Preliminary plans are to remove the floor joists, plywood deck, and carpeting in the sanctuary and restore the intricate terrazzo floor that was covered over in the 1980's remodel. A new altar will be installed to better reflect the architecture of our church. The existing granite altar will be used to construct bases for the Sacred Heart of Jesus, Mary, and St, Joseph statues. A replica of the original communion rail will be installed as well.

The restoration plan also includes a new handicap accessible confessional to be constructed in the alcove where the choir currently sings; converting the existing confessional space into a dressing room for the priests with additional storage for vestments; and remodeling the chapel to serve as a music room. Plans are also being made to restore the organ before it is moved into the new music room.



I graduated from St. Patrick High School in 2017. I spent a long time researching the perfect job for myself, but some of the most crucial information I needed was what I like to do. I had several pathways open to me, but I had trouble narrowing it down. Through the process of working on an undergraduate degree, and about six part time jobs, I learned more about what I was looking for in a career.

In 2020, I received a bachelor's degree from Western Michigan University and in 2021 I began a Prosthetic and Orthotic master's program at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, Texas. I am currently working through my residency and am on my way to becoming a CPO (Certified Prosthetist Orthotist).

If you've never heard of a CPO, you're not alone. Most people don't learn about this field until they need us.

A CPO is an allied health professional who specializes in orthotic and prosthetic devices. CPOs are trained to assess a patient's condition, recommend a device, fit the patient, and make any necessary modifications. These devices can be anything from artificial limbs to a back brace worn for scoliosis.

Ilove this job because it incorporates several of my interests. I wanted to work in the health field, have regular hours, and do something that allows me to remain active, be creative, and problem solve.

Most of my patients will need a device throughout their lifetime, which allows me to develop close relationships as I provide ongoing care. During a workday, I might evaluate patients for a device, take a cast or 3D scan of a patient's residual limb, build or fabricate an artificial limb, or make any number of modifications to a patient's current device. I can work to solve new problems and create new solutions for existing problems.

In my time as a Resident I will learn even more as I will do five clinical

rotations in different cities before taking my board exams.

There have been ups and downs throughout this entire process. Some days I'm thrilled to be doing work that allows people to regain their mobility and other days it's frustrating to still be learning as a resident.

Through the good and the bad of finding my future career, however, I have been grounded by my values that were formed as a student at St. Patrick School.

Morgan Thelen (2008)

I am a 2008 graduate of St. Patrick School. I earned my undergraduate degree at Aquinas College in Grand Rapids (2012) and my Doctorate of Dental Surgery degree from the University of Detroit Mercy (2016). Aside from my schooling, I have lived in Portland my entire life.

I spent all 21 years of my schooling at Catholic institutions. Some people will point out the great financial undertaking, but I don't regret a single moment. All levels of education, St. Patrick in particular, gave me the opportunity to grow in my faith, and to use it to impact

my corner of the world. It is amazing that such a small school draws such strong support from generations of families and newcomers alike. It is for this reason and countless others that I am indebted to my parents for the sacrifices they made to put me in a position to be the person I am today.

If I had a nickel for every time I told someone I was a dentist and they responded, "Gross. I hate the dentist," I'd be rich enough to actually quit dentistry. As far back as I can remember, I have wanted to be a dentist. I still have the Kindergarten questionnaire and the original dentist Barbie, circa 1996,

to prove it. Honestly, it wasn't until I actually began dental school that I realized why.

Following my second year, I had the opportunity to participate in a mission trip to Haiti with the George Stines Foundation. Haiti, a nation where 55% of the population practices Roman Catholicism, is the poorest country in the Western hemisphere. To say they lack access to dental care, is an understatement. were able to go through customs and deplane. That's when reality hit and we saw the news reports on the television.

We were in Toronto until Thursday, Sept.13. They released us to finally continue our journey to Chicago. My flight was the first flight allowed to land at Chicago O'Hare. It had been a sterile airport since Tuesday, Sept. 11. I later found out that we were escorted in by military fighter planes to make sure we didn't deviate from our flight path.

I was looking out the window when we were pulling into our gate. I could see United employees waving U.S. flags and cheering us. I couldn't control my emotions or the tears that were streaming down my face. I will never forget. I rented a car and drove home. I needed to be home and with my family.

My job as a flight attendant was the perfect job for me when the boys were in school. My schedule was a bit flexible, so I would fly on the weekends and I would be home during the week so that I was able to go to their school events. I would fly three-day domestic trips, flying about 12 days a month. People would always ask me if I worked part time! That always made me smile! Our schedules aren't like a 40-hour week. We don't start getting paid until our airplane leaves the gate from one city and arrives at the gate at the next city. That is flight time for us. Our duty days can be scheduled up to 14 hours. So, we do have long days.

I didn't get qualified for international flying until the boys were a bit older, because I didn't want to be that far away when they were young. My first international trip was to London. I figured I wouldn't have any communication problems because they spoke English. Well, their English was not quite like that of the U.S. and it was a challenge!

Most of the international flying I do now are three-day trips. Our layovers are usually about 24 hours, so, we have time to go out and explore a bit. I've been to some amazing cities. Eating bread, cheese and drinking wine sitting under the Eiffel Tower. Going to mass at Notre Dame in Paris. Walking up the Great Wall in China. Seeing the Taj Mahal in India. So many things to see in Rome. The Vatican, Colosseum, Pantheon, Trevi Fountain, St. Peter's Basilica, Sistine Chapel, Roman Forum, etc. So many wonderful places. I can't name them all! I feel so very fortunate to have had these experiences. All on my layovers!

I've met some amazing people and made some great new friendships. There is a reason why there are about 1,000 flight attendants that are senior to me. Some with over 50 years. This career is a tough one to give up.
