# Girls Track Team Does it Again! Division 4 State Runners Up, Relay Team State Champs



At the Division 4 Track & Field State Finals on Saturday, June 1, 2024, the Shamrock qualifiers showed up ready to compete!! And, it paid off! The girls finished as State Runners-Up for the second straight year!

The girls 4x200 relay of Izzy Kissane, Sophie Schrauben, Kenzie Fedewa, and Rylee Scheurer made



school history as they finished as State Champions, setting a Division 4 State Record. The girls ran 1:45.09 which broke the record of 1:45.38 that was set in 2009 by Potterville. Their effort also broke their school record of 1:46.75 set earlier this season. Congratulations on your amazing accomplishment!!

The girls 4x400 relay of Siena Schafer, Izzy Kissane, Sophie Schrauben, and Kenzie Fedewa finished as State Runners-Up in a school record time of 4:08.95. The prior record of 4:09.28 was set by the same team earlier this season.

Rylee Scheurer finished as State Runner-Up in the 200; and Bella Russman broke her discus school record, improving it from 100'7" to 101'1"

August is National Make-A-Will Month



## Tony Trierweiler

Baseball runs in the blood of the Trierweiler family, and perhaps none have exemplified that fact more than Tony Trierweiler, who starred at Portland St. Patrick as a shortstop and pitcher in the early 1970's before playing collegiately at Ferris State from 1974-1977.

Tony Trierweiler graduated from St. Pat's in 1972 and was a member of the 1971 baseball team that went to the State Finals. He earned his degree from Ferris State University, where he played baseball and was recruited by the minor leagues. His decision to decline the minors to continue to

pursue his degree in education eventually led him to return to his hometown to be a teacher and coach.

Tony led two Shamrock girls basketball teams to the State Finals (1978 1982) before leaving St. Pat's for employment other opportunities. He received his Master's Degree from Michigan State University.

Following his collegiate career, Tony played 19 years in the Lansing City League, which featured minor

league players, collegiate players, and some of the top high school players at the time.

Tony was recently selected to be part of the Greater Lansing Sports Hall of Fame Class of 2024, and was inducted on August 8, 2024, at a ceremony at the Lansing Center.

"It's a privilege and an honor, and I'm really grateful that they selected me," he said. "To be included with all the great athletes and the sports dignitaries that are in there is

really humbling and I'm just happy and excited to receive this honor."

Baeball was always part of his life. Tony's father, Pat Trierweiler signed and pitched for the New York Yankees farm team in 1954-55. In fact, Pat was away from home with

# Continuing Restoration

During the past several years, many improvements have been made to Saint Patrick Parish facilities. In addition, several major deferred maintenance issues have been identified and corrective action taken to ensure that our facilities will continue to serve the needs of Saint Patrick Parish.

Work on the masonry repairs on Saint Patrick School continues with replacement of damaged bricks, mainly on the parapet wall above the upper windows. The damage was caused by water infiltration and the freeze/thaw process. This damage was most evident on the original 1950 section of the school. Last year, parishioner Tom Daly of Purus Masonry Restoration, replaced over 5,500 damaged bricks on the upper section of the school along West Street. This summer, Tom and his crew completed work on the masonry repairs along Center Street. The damage




As planned and budgeted, restoration work continued on the north side of the school, where more than 2500 bricks needed to be relaced.

was less extensive than on the west side of the building but over 2,500 bricks still needed replacement. Several broken glass blocks in the gym windows were also replaced. Plans are to complete the exterior masonry repairs to the remaining areas of the school next year. This repair work will ensure the durability of the masonry for many years.

Energy conservation has also been a focus of maintenance work this summer. Parishioner, Jeremy Easlick of Batteries Plus, Grand Rapids, contacted maintenance head, Pat Heckman. He presented a proposal to upgrade the light fixtures to conserve energy that will reduce our electrical bill. The fluorescent tubes in the light fixtures

throughout the school have been replaced with LED bulbs. Electrical usage for lighting is expected to be reduced by up to 85%. A significant energy rebate from the City of Portland Commercial & Industrial Energy Efficiency Program, and competitive materials and installation costs should result in a payback period of about 6 months. This upgrade and reduced maintenance costs will result in a cost savings of hundreds of dollars per month on our electric bill.

You may have noticed a large trash bin parked outside the school office entrance. The insula-



tion on the heating and cooling system pipes have been replaced with a more efficient type of insulation. This upgrade will eliminate the condensation problem that became evident after the cooling system was installed.

Thank you Saint Patrick Parish parishioners for your generous donations to make these improvements, maintenance upgrades and repairs possible. Approximately \$500,000 needed to be spent on these and other maintenance projects this summer. Father Mike asks us to join him in making a contribution to cover these costs.
