The End of an Era Al Schrauben Announces Retirement

Much has been written about Al Schrauben over the years, and when he announced his retirement a few weeks ago, every news agency in the mid-Michigan area wrote or talked about him. Every article cited his 40-years of coaching and his remarkable record of 729-208 which places him third in the state, according to the MHSAA.

But, those who know Al personally or from observing him closely through the years know that there is so much more to this man than the media will ever know. He landed in the girls basketball coaching position unexpectedly, and no one dreamt that he would soon settle into that role and become one of the most notable and successful coaches in the state.

Al's wife Karla said that the first few years were stressful for her. They had a young family and Al was still helping coach football and baseball. But

once he focused on girls basketball, the stressful life changed into one that she embraced and cherished.

In talking to Al, it's amazing, that having coached nearly 1000 games, he can remember so many individual moments. He remembers the first time he drove the bus, carrying junior high players to Fowler. He misjudged the distance it would take to stop and took the corner at Divine Highway and Kimball Road a little too fast! He said that is when kids began praying before games.

He remembers missing a turn on the way to a game in Homer, and ending up in Albion, where a Christmas parade was going on. He claims, in typical Al fashion, that he nearly ran over some elves as he maneuvered into an area that was closed to traffic. Whether or not the green bus, affectionately known as The

He said that his most memorable game is the regional final game against Frankford in 2004. Al drove the bus, and on the way north they ran into a blinding snowstorm. It took 1 1/2 hours to go from Lowell to Muskegon, and the entire trip to Manistee took over five hours.

The start of the game had to be delayed so that the Lady Shamrocks could warm up when they finally arrived. The game itself turned out to be a white-knuckler, but one that the Shamrocks pulled off with a win, 43-41.

Karla's favorite memory is the state final game against Ashley in 1996. The Shamrocks trailed most of the game, and with just 16 seconds left on the clock they were down by five and starter Cindy Smith had just fouled out. But, a turn of events, including an unforgettable buzzer shot by freshman Janet Russman forced the game into overtime, where St. Pat's won 53-47. They were three-peat state champs!

Both of the Schraubens cherish their memories of the annual basketball camp at Manistee Catholic which became a tradition for many Shamrock families. That is where they discovered a piz-

za shop called Big Al's. The team members wanted to buy Al a shirt from the restaurant, but the only shirts available were the ones that the staff were wearing. One of the workers took off his own shirt, with a pizza sauce stain on the front, and gave it to the girls for their coach. That shirt, signed by all of the team members, is framed and hanging in Al and Karla's basement.

Stories about Al could fill volumes and provide hours of laughter and entertainment. Several of his former players shared their favorite memories, beginning on page 8.

A retirement party has been planned for Al and Karla, on Saturday, June 22, from 1:00-3:00 in the Entertainment Tent at Summer Fest. Be sure to stop in to wish them well!

Former Pastor Celebrates 60th Jubilee

"It was a mild December Saturday in Washington, DC. In the Church of the Holy Rosary, next to the White House the heavy hands of Archbishop Vagnozzi, the Apostolic Delegate, pressed hard on my head. A moment of powerful silence and I was a Priest in the line of one of the twelve Apostles. Only the next day did I fully perceive what had really changed.

"Sunday, was my first Mass.' Take and eat, this is my Body given for you!' I genuflected! All at once I felt the awesome power of those words. I was a Priest! Sixty years ago! I never guessed where the priesthood would lead me. What a life! Every day a new day, a new experience! I traveled the world, looking for sisters and brothers. I always found them in Jesus!"

These are the words of Father Julian Reganato, reflecting upon the day of his ordination in 1964. Fr. Julian is preparing to celebrate his 60th Jubilee Anniversary on December 19, 2024. During his 60 years as a priest, he has been a blessing to people all over the world.

He describes an experience a few years after ordination. "From 1966-1969, I moved to an ancient Medieval City with Bishop Luciani, later Pope John Paul I, now a saint. Among other ministries, he appointed me Chaplain in a Monastery of Cloistered Nuns. "Bishop, do you think I am too young for that?" He looked at me, smiled and said, 'But you are a priest!' I thought of Saint Paul and young Timothy."

Back in the United States, Fr. Julian worked in North Carolina, ministering to the poorest of the poor in the Black communities. When he integrated an all-white parish in

Father Julian had three goals at St. Pat's: To renovate the aging church; to bring the parish back together again; and to lead the great Shamrocks, boys and girls, to State Championships. He won on all three scores!

Shamrock fans from the early 90's will undoubtedly

remember seeing Fr. Julian on the sidelines the at football games. He loved the game and he loved the Shamrocks! What he didn't love were bad calls by the refs!

There was the memorable moment when Father Julian's reaction to a "bad" call (throwing his hat to the ground

and shouting at the ref) almost got him thrown off the field. A warning from the ref, along with divine intervention, allowed Fr. J. to stay on the sidelines, albeit with a less emotional demeanor!

As for what lies ahead, Fr. Julian says, "Where will I be going next? Only God knows. Maybe it's time to finish where it all began . . . back to Italy? Back to the future!"

Saying Goodbye to the Class of 2024 by Deacon Randy Hodge

When I began my tenure as administrator at St. Patrick School, this class wasn't yet in preschool and in fact, they most likely were still in diapers. It has been an honor, as their principal, to watch them go from preschoolers all the way to graduates. Now, it is time to say goodbye as they go forth, continuing to build on the rock-solid foundation they built here, and move on to the next phase of their lives.

It has been enjoyable watching this class continue to grow, becoming strong leaders in their senior year when they spearheaded our annual Spirit Week celebration. The maturity and growth continued through the fall, winter, and spring sports seasons; the planning of their senior trip to Boyne Mountain Resort; the senior banquet; the last week of school activities including our annual softball tournament; and finally, commencement.

On Sunday, May 19, graduation day began with Mass celebrated by Most Reverend Bishop David Walkowiak. After Mass, the graduates and their families moved to the school gymnasium for commencement. I opened the ceremony with prayer and shared the major achievements of the Class of 2024 which include:

- 14 of the 24 students are members of the National Honor Society.
- 16 out of 24 were recognized as CMAC Scholar Athletes meaning they had at least a 3.4 GPA and lettered in at least two sports, one of which was in their senior year.
- 21 out of the 24 plan to go on to some form of higher education, with two entering the workforce, and one beginning a career in the military.
- · Four have signed National Letters of Intent to continue their sports careers in college.
- 16 of the 24 are graduating with honors (3.79 GPA or higher) with seven having a GPA of 4.0 or higher and 21 having a grade point average of 3.50 or higher.
- · They were offered 1.5 million dollars in scholarship money and have accepted \$457,000 of that money.

Valedictorian Alaina Forist and Salutatorians Olivia Pung, Rylee Scheurer, and Hannah Weller addressed their classmates, thanking them for making their class feel like a family. They also thanked those who helped them along the way, sharing accomplishments, memories, good times together, and all the possibilities for a great future.

Following the speeches, the graduates were called forward to receive their diplomas from Bishop Walkowiak. One by one they turned their tassels, and the Class of 2024 joined a group of more than 2,300 Shamrock alumni around the world.

Reverend Michael Alber, officially closed the ceremony with prayer, the graduates processed out of the gym and into the future. Following their final class picture together and the traditional tossing of caps, there were hugs, handshakes, and family pictures to take.

As seniors, the Class of 2024 succeeded in ensuring all our students had a great year. They served as role models for our younger

students, especially their Little Rocks, and provided many outstanding suggestions for ways to improve our school. We are all extremely proud of all that they accomplished during their time at St. Patrick School. 


Literacy Night: Sponsored by the Lancaster Family



All About Al—Memories

Word got out quickly this spring that Al Schrauben was stepping down after coaching basketball at St. Patrick School for 40 years, and the memories began to flow! Many of the memories are of his rookie days with the Lady Shamrocks, and the adjustments that they had to make as they got used to each other. Some of the memories are funny and some are poignant. All of those memories and reflections don't begin to sufficiently pay tribute to the man who brought notice to a small rural Catholic school; a man who will never realize the positive impact that he had on so many people; a man who will ever be a legend within the walls of Portland St. Pat's.

SHARI SINES BURLAND: My memories of playing for Al are all so

positive! He walked that fine line of being an effective and good coach without taking the fun out of playing. He could laugh along with us when funny things would happen, and funny things definitely happened! One in particular was when we were playing a team with a big player that was guarding me aggressively and by the fourth quarter, I had lost it and gave her a fist in the back to move her. I was called for the foul and left the game but later that night he had the parents over to his house for senior night and as we watched the tape of the game, he



put that shove on replay and we all laughed watching it over and over. I'm happy you're doing a tribute to him! He's the best!

MARY KRAMER COOK: Our first season with Al was my senior year. Shari Sines Burland, Cathy Snitgen Simon, Lisa Schrauben Kemmis and I were the four seniors. It was fall of 1985 - back when girls basketball was played in the fall. There was no three-point line. We played with the same size ball as boys, as girls-sized basketballs had not yet been introduced in high school. Socks were worn up to the knees and it was the era at St. Pat's when the color gold was used in the uniforms along with green and white. We played and practiced at the Pit with fans in bleachers and on the stage.

I remember Al not knowing what to think about us. He knew all of us and we knew him. We had him as a teacher in junior high. But he had never coached girls and he didn't have any daughters of his own. Most of us had played under Tony Trierweiler who had



coached girls for many seasons. We also had female JV coaches. This was Al's first rodeo with females and our first rodeo with a coach who had no experience coaching girls. I don't think anything could have prepared him for that first season.

One day, Al had us running Z-drills. It was a tough practice and of course hotter than blazes in the gym. We didn't have

practice jerseys back then, we had very thick reversible shirts. And I mean thick, like sweatshirt material. So we were sweating like crazy.

I was sweating so bad that when I stooped down to touch the line (for the Z-drill) my pad literally fell out of my underwear/shorts and landed on the court!! (Don't ask me how it fell out cuz I have no idea - I just know it would no longer stick due to all the perspiration). In one swoop I picked it up and ran into the locker room. Al was completely speechless. He had absolutely no idea what to say or do. Needless to say, practice ended right then and there. I don't even think he was in the gym anymore when I came out of the locker room.




Regardless of us being girls, it never ever stopped him from yelling at us. One time during a game he told Diane (Cook) Hafner not to foul. Well, Diane fouled. Al was so beside himself that he stood up and moved three rows up behind the bench. We looked over to see our coach in the middle of the stands!! He was so mad!

LISA SCHRAUBEN LEHMAN: There are two memories that I have that probably won't be printable but boy are they memorable!

Kathy Snitgen's bra strap broke during one of our first games. She ran to the sidelines and told AI she needed to come out because her bra broke. He grabbed her, threw her on the bench, grabbed the next person and threw her in. Of course he got a technical because he didn't check people in and out properly!

The one I keep trying to forget is when I made him so mad. We had the game won against Potterville. He called time out and he said all we have to do is not foul! I went in and fouled immediately! He ran to the top of the bleachers and put his hands over his head and kept

bouncing up and down!

do recall our first game at the PIT - Al's first game as a girls' basketball coach. I don't recall who we played, but I do remember winning because our team (of 9) Lady Shamrocks were celebrating in the locker room. I recall us waiting and waiting and waiting for Coach Schrauben to come down and meet/ celebrate with us. After waiting what seemed like forever, we all

decided to change/shower and head back upstairs. Well Coach Schrauben was helping the janitor sweep the floor and to guote him: "I didn't know what to do with nine ladies in a locker room ."

He soon became accustomed to us! I like to think that the Class of 1986 is responsible for breaking him in. He's truly one of the best.

ALEX (BOOBER) SCHRAUBEN: I know that a lot of people are sharing memories about how my dad has impacted kids' lives. His impact on young (and to be honest, now old) St. Patrick students will be a legacy that I hope will live forever. Being his son, during my young years I will never forget being the water boy on the bench, riding (and dancing) on the bus to away games, and attending practice. It was some of the best years of my life. I have always admired how humble my dad is about all the accomplishments of his program. I have never met someone that has so much to "brag about" but would never in his wildest dreams flaunt any of his achievements to anyone. It has always been about the students and the community, not himself. I know that dad has done a lot for St. Patrick's but I know if you asked him it is not even close to what St. Patricks' has done for him and our family as a whole.

KIM SCHAFER: It was an honor to be coached by Mr. Schrauben.



He not only instilled a drive and edge to compete on the basketball court, he took it the extra mile to extend in everyday life. I appreciate his commitment didn't end after graduation. I have always felt connected with him and valued in my adult life too. Enjoy retirement! You deserve it!

NIKKI BROWN: All is one of those coaches that I will just never forget. The popsicles after hot practices, piling into the big van to head to the beach at basketball camp, the occasional yell on the court but knowing it was done out of a desire for us to improve, and now the hug whenever I see him. He is one of a kind—a legend—and I am so grateful that I was able to be counted as one of his players.

TARA KLEIN: One memory I have is whenever we had to take I-96 West to a basketball game, Al was always sure to hit that on ramp just right, where we would all fly out of our seats! Got us every time! It just speaks to his character though; always a well rounded guy. One minute he'd be chewing your butt out on the court and then

he'd be joking around. He will be

missed.

DANIELLE (SIMON) ORR: Anyone who has been around Mr. Schrauben has a funny moment or story - he's a pretty memorable person. Like many others, I could probably fill a book of ridiculous things he has said or done but I'll just share one.

My senior year we were on the road for a game, this was one of the last years he was still driving the bus. After the game was over we all piled on and he drove the bus to



the other side of the parking lot. He had opened the driver window and was talking with one of his sons who handed him a Meijer bag with something in it. Mr. Schrauben started laughing, tossed it in the aisle, and began driving away.

Jocelyn and Michelle were both yelling at him so I walk to the front to see what was going on. He said to me, "These two are too chicken to open the bag, will you do it?"

I ask what was in it and he wouldn't tell me. So I opened the bag slowly to find a dead squirrel. I dropped it back on the ground and asked why that' was on our bus. He proceeded to tell us that it was dinner for him and Karla tomorrow. He then proceeded to drive us all home with a dead squirrel on the bus.

Jokes aside, as a player, he made us feel valued and loved, pushed us to be our best, and cared about us off the court. Being able to coach with Mr. Schrauben the last couple of years is something I'm very grateful for. I have learned an incredible amount, but I think the



most valuable thing is to not take the game too seriously. Basketball is supposed to be fun and he really tried to make sure all of his players had a great experience, whether basketball was their passion or not. Mr. Schrauben really is one of a kind and will be missed.

"Thank you" doesn't do justice to the impact he had on his players. St Pat's and this community. We wouldn't be the players, program, or people that we are today without Mr. Schrauben's dedication, compassion, and leadership.

KENDALL (SCHRAUBEN) SIMON: Few people have had as much of a profoundly positive impact on my life as Al Schrauben. Through basketball, Al was a constant source of encouragement and support for my sisters and me, acting as a steady lifeboat during (what I

now know to be) some turbulent times. And as a shy, introverted farm kid, Al somehow found a way to speak my language without actually talking.

It wasn't until recently, as an adult, that I've realized how much Al taught me during these years. Al

taught me that just the tiniest bit of humor can lighten the heaviest of moments. He taught me that true leaders inspire and empower those around them. And by setting this high bar, I haven't settled for leadership that exemplifies anything less. Al taught me the importance of being informed on current events, as well as the consequences of not making my free throws in practice - having to shoot granny style (during a game).

My favorite memory of Al, though, is the day we lost to Lansing Christian in the state finals at the Breslin Center my junior year. I had played nearly the entire game and was working so hard, but I was extremely nervous and had missed shot after shot. Al finally took me out for the last few minutes. I sat at the end of the bench, extremely angry and frustrated with myself. As the last few seconds of the game were ticking down on the clock, it became obvious that we weren't going to win. Al looked down the bench and we briefly made eve contact before I glanced away to hide the hot sting of tears welling in my eyes. My young, tender heart was breaking because I felt that I had let everyone down. Recognizing this, Al slowly walked over to the end of the bench, patted my head, and then walked back. No words were needed.

I think about this day all the time. And when I do, I never remember specific plays. Or points scored. Or a trophy. I only remember the subtle act of kindness and comfort that he showed me in that moment of hurt, in a language that only he and I spoke. That is the magic of Al. And through this, I've learned that no matter what life



Al Was Teacher and Mentor

It is hard to believe that an era at St. Patrick School is coming to an end. Recently varsity basketball coach Al Schrauben announced his retirement, after 40 years at the helm. Al has been a great friend and mentor and I wanted to congratulate him and share my thoughts and memories of coach Schrauben.

My first memory of Mr. Al Schrauben was when I was a fifth-grade student at St. Patrick School. My brother Tom was playing 7th grade basketball and I volunteered to serve as the manager for the team. They had practice one snowy Saturday morning and since coach Schrauben was our neighbor, he offered to pick us up on the way to town. My brother let me know that we had to meet him at the bottom of the driveway because the tires



on his car were too bald to make it up our driveway. When we got to the bottom of the driveway, coach Schrauben got out of the car and let us in through the driver's side door because his passenger door didn't work.

A few years later, I had Mr. Schrauben as a teacher in seventh and eighth grades. I remember playing a study game where he asked us a question and if we had the correct answer, we had the opportunity to shoot a basket on a small rim and if we made it, we gained a bonus point. I used that idea myself when I later became a social studies teacher. I also remember those days when he knew we needed a mental break from social studies, and he would have us write an essay on some odd and random topic. Finally, I remember that his first-born son Adam was born during my time in middle school and we were all entered into a pool to see who guessed his date of birth correctly.

Many years later when I was a coach and teacher, and Al was the Athletic Director he hired me to become the junior varsity volleyball coach. After a couple of years of doing that the varsity position opened up and he hired me to be the varsity volleyball coach which I did for 13 years. He jokingly told me that he had reservations about hiring me because he wasn't sure how a guy as short as me could teach the girls how to spike and block.

During my tenure as varsity volleyball coach, the junior varsity softball coaching position opened and again he hired me for that position, and I did that for another seven years. Mr. Schrauben was a great mentor to have during my coaching years and taught me a lot about the mindset of a coach and how to be a leader of young student athletes.

Since I was coaching two sports, he suggested that it was time that I go and get my Certified Drivers License (CDL) and begin driving the bus, which I did. I have now been driving bus for 20 years and still officially have the title of Transportation Supervisor for the past 16 years at St. Patrick School because of this recommendation.

I thank Coach Al Schrauben for helping me to become a social

studies teacher, a coach, a bus driver, and the principal of St. Patrick School. I thank him for some great road trips, many, many great stories, his mentorship, his friendship, and for all that he has done to make St. Patrick School the great place it is today.

I also especially would like to thank his secretary and better half Karla, for all the support she has given him and St. Patrick School throughout the many years Al served as a teacher, coach, and athletic director. May God bless them both as they begin a new phase of their lives.

I have been lucky enough to sit along Mr. Schrauben's bench for over 20 years now, three years as a player and 17 years as a coach. Every practice, every game, and every bus ride a memory is made through his witty stories, silly comments, and genuine love for the game and players he coaches. It is difficult to reflect back on specific stories that stick out more than others so I will summarize what playing for, and coaching with, Al means to me.

As a junior high student, I watched from the stands as he won his first State Championship and from that point forward, I wanted nothing more than to be a part of his team. As a sophomore, I will never forget when I found out I would be playing on the varsity. It was not elaborate in any way, but certainly is a memory I will never forget. He simply pulled three of us into the hallway after economics class and said 'practice is at 2:30.'

As my sophomore year went on I found out what being a member of his program was about. I never felt more of a sense of honor and pride to be a part of so many traditions within a sport. I learned the cheers, dances, and prayers on the bus and in the locker room before the game and the top secret 'saying' in the huddle after starting lineup announcements. I got my first taste of a "Karla story" and never laughed so hard when stories were told of past players and teams.

We lost that year in the District finals and I will never forget the sense of sadness that came over me, not entirely because we lost, but because I would have to wait another year to attend practice, games, and to experience that sense of team again. In the locker room after that loss, I will always remember when AI came in and shed tears with us and thanked us for our hard work and dedication to the season and hugged each of us. As I watched the seniors embrace him, I knew he was more than a coach to us all, he was a friend and mentor.

My junior year brought even more unforgettable memories. This was the first year our program attended the annual Manistee summer camp. From the beginning, Al made the camp about so much more than basketball; it was a family event where team members and their families began a new tradition. It was here that we met 'Hockey Dave', took trips to the Bargain Barn, took the team 'jumping on the beach' photo, made time for a quick stop at House of Flavors, and of course Big Al's for pizza.

This was also the season that brought great battles with Fowler, whom we would eventually play in the State Championship game. Expectations were high for our team and we expected nothing less. I remember our final practice, which we asked to have. Al said there is nothing more to work on, just do what we have worked on all year and listen to what I say and we will be fine. Of course, he was right, and we won the State title.

As a senior there was an expectation that we should be leaders and he taught us the importance of strong leadership which was an in-

valuable lesson that carries on with me today as a coach and as a working professional. I will always remember walking out of Rose Arena with the State Championship trophy in hand and riding the bus with the police escort back to the gym where the community was awaiting to celebrate our accomplishment. senior teammates and I cried that our journey with our legendary coach had come to an end and even though in

St. Patrick Church Cestoration

Revised Plans for Our Church

As previously reported, plans for the restoration and expansion of St. Patrick Church and new parish and school office space have been submitted to the Diocese of Grand Rapids for approval. As construction blueprints are being finalized by the Progressive A/E architectural firm, some aspects of the design will be started in phases as early as this summer. Thanks to the generosity of St. Patrick Parish parishioners, preliminary plans are to begin restoration in the balcony to make space for our talented musicians. As funds become available, the focus will be the restoration of the sanctuary.

Several months ago, the organ was sent out for repairs and improvements. As previously reported, our musicians, organ and piano will be moved to the balcony. Some structural work will be made to ensure that the weight of the organ and piano can be safely supported. Ornamental organ pipes will also be installed in the balcony.

The sanctuary restoration will include the removal of the raised floor installed in the 1980's remodel. The original terazzo floor will be polished and necessary repairs made to reveal the beautiful colors and pattern. A new altar and ambo, that better reflect the architecture of the church, will be installed.

As you may have noticed, the 100-year-old church bell has not been rung for several months. Father Mike had the bell inspected and issues have been identified. The bolts holding the support structure of the bell have loosened over the years with the recommendation that the bell be silenced until repairs can be made. Along with repairs, an automated system will be installed to ring the bell. I recall that when I was a child the bell was rung at noon for the Angelus. With the automated system the bell will again ring at noon.


The new office space will allow the parish and school office staff to be located together to allow better coordination between the church and school personnel. The church addition will provide much needed additional seating. The current seating capacity of 450 people is often exceeded during the 10:00 Sunday Mass and special services at Christmas, Easter, First Communion, and the graduation Mass.

As you are well aware, the Diocese of Grand Rapids is experiencing a shortage of priests. In the foreseeable future, diocesan priests may have to serve as pastor of two parishes. In such a scenario, parish priests may be limited to say one Saturday evening Mass and one Sunday morning Mass

at each parish. The increased seating in the church addition will make this situation workable if not ideal. Continue to pray The Prayer for Vocations for an increase in priests, deacons, and religious life.

I have been amazed at the generosity of our parishioners to complete much needed repairs and improvements to St. Patrick Parish facilities over the past several years. Major projects completed under the leadership of Father Mike include the new roof with added insulation on the school, restoration of the church foundation and front entry steps,

and new student and staff bathrooms in the school. Thank you for your past donations and ask you to prayerfully consider your continued support of St. Patrick Parish.
